Selected 2012 findings relating to parental controls



Key findings (1)



How many parents of children who use the internet have parental controls?

 41% of parents whose child uses the internet at home say they have controls set or software loaded to stop their child viewing certain types of website

Why are parental controls in the home? [prompted, single code question]

• The majority of parental controls either came already loaded (46%) or were installed as a precaution (43%). 8% of parents say they installed parental controls because someone in the household had seen something inappropriate online

How parents heard about parental controls [prompted, multicode question]

 40% of parents with parental controls say they heard about them from a friend or relative and 27% heard about them from their ISP. 8% heard about it in the media and 4% heard about it from the child's school

Key findings (2)



Reasons why parents don't have parental controls [prompted, multicode question]

- 48% of parents without parental controls say that is because they trust their child to be sensible/responsible. This increases substantially with the age of the child.
- 39% say that their child is always supervised.
- 14% say their child learns how to be safe at school (7% of 5-7s v 14% of 8-11s v 17% of 12-15s)
- 12% say that their child hasn't come across anything of concern online
- 8% say their child is too young for parental controls (36% of 5-7s compared to 6% of 8-11s and 0% of 12-15s)
- 8% say their child is too old for PC (16% of 12-15s v 1% of 5-7s and 2% of 8-11s)
- 6% say they weren't aware of them
- 6% say their child would find a way round the controls (11% of 12-15s)
- 4% say that setting controls would prevent other family members accessing what they want
- 3% say they used to have them but have now stopped using them
