Additional comments:

Question 1: Do you agree that copy management would broaden the range of HD content available on DTT and help secure its long term viability as a platform?:

No. Copy protection would be used, much as it has been through other paths like the Apple iTunes store, to control access to existing content to extract additional revenue from consumers, rather than encouraging additional content. BBC content suppliers will supply content regardless of copy protection. I also believe the long term viability of the platform is threatened by DRM. Experience has shown that DRM leads to consumer frustration (as older iPhones, iPods, etc fail to play the content and consumers are forced to pay for upgrades) and will likely therefore increase piracy rather than reduce it. Pirates have a history of rapidly breaking DRM and only genuine consumers then suffer a lack of functionality.

Question 2: Do you agree that the BBC?s proposed multiplex licence amendment represents the most appropriate means for securing an effective content management system on HD DTT?:

No. It is insufficient to prevent piracy but significant enough to cause cost and inconvenience to consumers. If piracy is to be the main target (and not squeezing additional revenue from consumers) a substantially stronger DRM system would be more appropriate.

Question 3: Do you agree with the proposed change to Condition 6 in the Multiplex B Licence?:

No. I would prefer a removal of all DRM proposals.

Question 4: Do you agree that Multiplexes C and D should be granted a similar amendment to their Licences as Multiplex B?.:

No. Any DRM will add restrictions to legitimate use of content and, as experience has shown, offer limited resistance to pirates. Content would still be copied illegally, but consumers and license fee payers would be prevented from making legitimate use of content. Freedom of access to content should be guaranteed.

Question 6: Do you agree that the BBC?s proposed choice of content management technologies will have only a negligible impact on the cost of HD DTT receivers and their interoperability with other HD consumer equipment? .:

No. The cost for manufacturers might be negligible, but consumers who have to replace existing equipment (iPods, mobile phones etc) the cost could be very significant.
