It may, in the short term, broaden the range of content. In the longer term, it would reduce access to HD content, and would be the first step to proprietising the entire platform. This would undoubtedly harm long-term viability.

No. It is simply extra regulation.

It would not prevent people copying content, it would simply generate bureaucracy. There would be absolutely no measurable impact in copying.
