Additional comments:

I do not want my mail left with neighbours - or at my local post office for my collection either. What is the point of proof of delivery when your mail can be delivered elsewhere? And what about things I might prefer to refuse at the doorstep? And what about recorded, signed for post? How will anyone identify the signature if it is not their own? Again why should I pay for that security if someone else might still take delivery of the item?

If a neighbour takes delivery and they have not had a chance to bring the time to me and then are not home at the times I try to get it from them? And why should I, or they, have the inconvenience of delivering mail to addressees? Surely that is what we are paying Royal Mail to do! Similarly, why should I have the inconvenience of gong to my local post office and queueing to collect an item that someone has paid Royal Mail to deliver to ME?

I prefer to be carded when I am not home and to then have the option to request a further delivery attempt at a time when someone will be here. I would only be willing for an item to be delivered to a neighbour, or left at my local post office, if I had chosen that option when I have been carded for it. It should NEVER be automatic.

I very much resent the way Royal Mail are reducing the quality of their service and pushing some of their workload and responsibility onto their customers and their customers' neighbours.
