I would not accept a parcel for them, because it would give them an excuse to approach me. I would be happy for a parcel of mine to be delivered to any other neighbour and to accept parcels for them.

No

I agree in principle but with the ability to opt in rather than opt out.

I think we should be able to opt in rather than need to opt out. Possibly with the option of specifying a couple of possible neighbours. In the circumstances I do not want to display on my letter box the fact that I have opted out, or if I had the choice, say which neighbour I would not like my parcel to be delivered to.

When I order something I bear in mind the likely delivery day and try and make sure it is on a day I should be in. I follow the tracking information and if I have the option I specify where a parcel is to be left. I can avoid the need to have a parcel left with a neighbour. However I am more likely to get unexpected parcels from Royal Mail and therefore this is a bigger problem than for other carriers
