Rugby World Cup Finals Tournament 2023

#### **CONSULTATION:**

Publication date: 26 July 2023

Closing date for responses: 23 August 2023

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## 1. Overview

#### What we are consulting on

Ofcom has received a request from ITV for consent to broadcast exclusive live coverage of the 2023 Rugby World Cup Finals tournament ('2023 Rugby World Cup'). The tournament is due to take place in France from 8 September until 28 October 2023.

The Rugby World Cup Final is designated as Group A listed event. All other matches in the tournament are designated as Group B listed events. Under the Broadcasting Act 1996, Ofcom's consent is needed for exclusive live coverage of Group A and Group B listed events.

Ofcom is provisionally minded to grant consent to ITV for exclusive live coverage of the Final and all other matches in the tournament, subject to considering any concerns raised in response to this consultation.

# 2. Rugby World Cup Finals Tournament 2023

#### **Background**

- Ofcom has received a request from ITV for consent to broadcast exclusive live coverage of the 2023 Rugby World Cup Final and all other matches in the 2023 Rugby World Cup Finals Tournament ('2023 Rugby World Cup'). The tournament is due to take place in France from 8 September until 28 October 2023.
- 2.2 The Rugby World Cup Final is designated as a Group A listed event. All other matches in the tournament are designated as Group B listed events. Under the Broadcasting Act 1996, Ofcom's consent is needed for exclusive live coverage of Group A and Group B listed events.

#### **Proposed coverage**

- 2.3 ITV plans to broadcast full live coverage of the Rugby World Cup Final on ITV1 and across the Channel 3 network, including on STV.
- 2.4 Of the other 47 matches in the tournament, ITV plans to broadcast full live coverage of 37 matches on ITV1 (and across the Channel 3 network, including STV), and 10 matches on ITV3 or ITV4.
- 2.5 ITV plans to make available highlights for all matches, including the Final, on ITVX.
- 2.6 ITV therefore applies for consent on behalf of the relevant licensees for these services to show exclusive live coverage of the Rugby World Cup Final (a Group A listed event) and exclusive live coverage of the other Rugby World Cup tournament matches (Group B listed events).<sup>1</sup>

## **Rights acquisition**

- 2.7 ITV has explained that it acquired the relevant rights to the 2023 Rugby World Cup in 2016, as part of the same tender process through which it acquired rights to the 2019 Rugby World Cup. We granted consent to ITV's exclusive live coverage of the 2019 Rugby World Cup in September 2019, following a consultation.
- 2.8 ITV told us that IMG (acting as agents for Rugby World Cup Limited) issued an invitation to tender to interested parties in January 2016 inviting broadcasters and other media organisations to submit a bid for the 2019 and/or 2023 Rugby World Cup.<sup>2</sup> We understand that broadcasters of both "qualifying" and "non-qualifying" services for the purposes of the listed events regime) had opportunity to bid for the rights.

- 2.9 The bidding took place between January and March 2016. ITV said that this was a reasonable time period to allow potential bidders to prepare and submit their bids. ITV also told us that the bidding process was conducted over two stages and that it understood that there was genuine competition for the rights.
- 2.10 ITV said that the price sought and achieved for the rights to the event was fair at the time and in line with similar events.
- 2.11 Based on the information provided to us by ITV, our provisional view is that broadcasters of both qualifying and non-qualifying services had an opportunity to acquire the rights to live coverage of the 2023 Rugby World Cup on fair and reasonable terms.

#### **Proposal to grant consent**

- 2.12 Ofcom's Code on Sports and Other Listed and Designated Events ("the Code")<sup>3</sup> explains that in deciding whether to give consent to a broadcaster for exclusive live coverage of a listed event, Ofcom will wish to be satisfied that broadcasters have had a genuine opportunity to acquire the rights on fair and reasonable terms.<sup>4</sup>
- 2.13 As set out above, it is our provisional view that broadcasters had the opportunity to acquire the rights on fair and reasonable terms.
- 2.14 We also note that ITV's plans would secure full and live, free to air coverage of the 2023 Ruby World Cup.
- 2.15 Ofcom is therefore provisionally minded to grant consent to ITV for exclusive live coverage of the Final and all other matches in the Tournament, subject to considering any comments received from interested parties.<sup>5</sup>

- A1.11 If someone asks us to keep part or all of a response confidential, we will treat this request seriously and try to respect it. But sometimes we will need to publish all responses, including those that are marked as confidential, in order to meet legal obligations.
- A1.12 Please also note that copyright and all other intellectual property in responses will be assumed to be licensed to Ofcom to use. Ofcom's intellectual property rights are explained further in our Terms of Use.

#### **Next steps**

- A1.13 Following this consultation period, Ofcom plans to publish its decision on consent for the 2023 Rugby World Cup on 4 September 2023.

# A2. Ofcom's consultation principles

# Ofcom has seven principles that it follows for every public written consultation:

#### Before the consultation

A2.1 Wherever possible, we will hold informal talks with people and organisations before announcing a big consultation, to find out whether we are thinking along the right lines. If we do not have enough time to do this, we will hold an open meeting to explain our proposals, shortly after announcing the consultation.

#### **During the consultation**

- A2.2 We will be clear about whom we are consulting, why, on what questions and for how long.
- A2.3 We will make the consultation document as short and simple as possible, with a summary of no more than two pages. We will try to make it as easy as possible for people to give us a written response. If the consultation is complicated, we may provide a short Plain English / Cymraeg Clir guide, to help smaller organisations or individuals who would not otherwise be able to spare the time to share their views.
- A2.4 We will consult for up to ten weeks, depending on the potential impact of our proposals.
- A2.5 A person within Ofcom will be in charge of making sure we follow our own guidelines and aim to reach the largest possible number of people and organisations who may be interested in the outcome of our decisions. Ofcom's Consultation Champion is the main person to contact if you have views on the way we run our consultations.
- A2.6 If we are not able to follow any of these seven principles, we will explain why.

#### After the consultation

A2.7 We think it is important that everyone who is interested in an issue can see other people's views, so we usually publish all the responses on our website as soon as we receive them. After the consultation we will make our decisions and publish a statement explaining what we are going to do, and why, showing how respondents' views helped to shape these decisions.
