Additional comments:

The DELIVERY SERVICE PROVIDER MUST ask addressees for a list of alternative delivery points. It MUST ask if the list given can be shared among all DELIVERY SERVICE PROVIDERS (so that one database will suffice for all). It MUST indicate how this list can be maintained or updated by the addressee (e.g. on-line with password access). Lists are to be assigned to ADDRESSEES not ADDRESSES. Each delivery point to be assigned a number [1, 2...]

No additional charges should be payable where an item has been left at an alternative delivery point.

The DELIVERY SERVICE must deliver a NOTIFICATION CARD addressed to the addressee at the addressee's address which indicates which of the alternative delivery points the item has been left - an indication by number only (so that other residents at the address won't necessarily know where the item's been left.)
