Requests to change Format

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Section 1

About this document

Ofcom is consulting on whether to approve Format Change Requests from the owners of Heartland FM in Perth and Wave 102 in Dundee. If approved, the requests would enable the two radio stations to be co-located at Wave 102's studios in Dundee, and to share all local programming hours. The Perth licensee is also proposing to increase the amount of local news it broadcasts. The consultation closes on Tuesday 11 October 2016.

Section 2

The Format change requests

- 1.1 Ofcom has received requests from the respective owners of the Perth and Dundee local analogue FM commercial radio licences to co-locate the two radio stations at Dundee, and to share all local programming hours. The Perth licence is currently held by The Heartland Radio Foundation Limited ('HRF'), broadcasting as Heartland FM, and the Dundee licence is held by Wave 102 FM Limited ('Wave 102'), broadcasting as Wave 102.
- 1.2 The Perth licence was launched in May 2008 as Perth FM. In January 2011, the licence was transferred to HRF, which already owned the neighbouring Pitlochry & Aberfeldy local commercial radio licence, Heartland FM. Perth FM was rebranded as Heartland FM, and permission was given by Ofcom for the Perth licence to be broadcast from within the Pitlochry & Aberfeldy licence area, and to share all local programming hours with the Pitlochry & Aberfeldy service. The Perth licence has a Measured Coverage Area of 45,276 adults (aged 15+).
- 1.3 The Dundee licence was launched in 1999 as Wave 102. In 2007, the licence was acquired from The Wireless Group by its current owners, New Wave Media. The licence does not currently have any co-location or programme sharing arrangements in place. The Dundee licence has a Measured Coverage Area of 110,461 adults (aged 15+).
- 1.4 With regard to the Perth licence, HRF wishes to:
 - Replace the current permissions to produce locally-made programming from within the Pitlochry & Aberfeldy licenced area with permissions to produce locally-made programming from within the Dundee licenced area.
 - Replace the current permissions to share all locally-made programming with the Pitlochry & Aberfeldy licence with permissions to share all locally-made programming with the Dundee licence.
 - Increase the requirement for local news bulletins from the current requirement of weekdays at 08.10 and 09.10 to at least hourly during peaktimes.¹
- 1.5 With regard to the Dundee licence, Wave 102 wishes to:
 - Obtain permissions to share all of its locally-made programming with the Perth licence. (Locally-made programming hours on Wave 102 would continue to be produced from the station's existing studios in Dundee).

Statutory framework and considerations

- 1.5 Under section 106(1A) of the Broadcasting Act 1990 (as amended), Ofcom may consent to a change of a Format² only if it is satisfied that *at least* one of the following five statutory criteria is satisfied:

¹ Peaktime is defined by Ofcom as weekday breakfast and afternoon drive-time, and weekend late breakfast.

² A change to a Format is described in the legislation as a 'departure to a character of service'.

- (a) that the departure would not substantially alter the character of service;*
- (b) that the departure would not narrow the range of programmes available by way of relevant independent radio services to persons living the area or locality for which the service is licensed to be provided;*
- (c) that the departure would be conducive to the maintenance or promotion of fair and effective competition;*
- (d) that there is evidence that, amongst persons living in that area or locality, there is a significant demand for, or significant support for, the change that would result from the departure; or*
- (e) that (i) the departure would result from programmes included in the licensed service ceasing to be made at premises in the area or locality for which the service is provided, but (ii) those programmes would continue to be made wholly or partly at premises within the approved area (as defined in section 314 of the Communications Act 2003 (local content and character of services)).*

- 1.6 Even if Ofcom is of the opinion that the proposed change satisfies one of more of the statutory criteria above, there may be reasons (depending on the particular circumstances of the case) why Ofcom may not consent to the proposed change. - 1.7 Our view is that the changes proposed by HRF and Wave 102 would represent a significant change to the output of the existing Heartland FM service received by listeners in Perth. In addition to the music and presenters changing as a result of sharing Wave 102's programming, listeners to the Perth service would hear – in addition to local Perth news and information – 'out of area' news and information pertinent to Dundee, rather than 'out of area' information relevant to the Pitlochry & Aberfeldy area. Although Pitlochry and Dundee are both similar distances from Perth, our view was that Perth has a greater cultural affinity with the Pitlochry area, whereas Dundee tends to be viewed by locals as more as a 'rival' city to Perth, with a significantly larger population than Perth.
- 1.8 Therefore, in accordance with section 106ZA of the Broadcasting Act 1990, we are consulting on the request. Wave 102's request to share programming also needs to be considered as part of this consultation, given that in order for HRF's proposal to be possible, Wave 102 would need also need permissions to share its output with the Perth licence.
- 1.9 In particular, we are considering whether criterion (b) is satisfied (the change would not narrow the range of programmes available in the area by way of relevant independent radio services). In considering this, neither local DAB services nor BBC services 'count' as relevant independent radio services. The relevant independent radio services are those local analogue commercial and community stations which operate in the region, which are listed in Annex 9. We note that Wave 102's broadcasts are not currently available to most listeners in the Perth area.
- 1.10 Annexes 5 and 6 contain the Format change requests submitted by HRF and Wave, in which arguments are made that the statutory criterions (a) to (d) are satisfied.

- 1.11 We are seeking views on the request, having particular regard to the Format change criteria set out in Section 106(1A) (b) to (d) of the Broadcasting Act 1990 (as amended).
- 1.12 Having reviewed the detailed information provided to us by HRF with regard to its current financial status, we are satisfied that consulting for the normal 28-day statutory period would result in a delay that would be likely prejudicially to affect the interests of the licence holder.
- 1.13 Therefore, pursuant to section 106ZA(4) of the 1990 Broadcasting Act, as amended by the Communications Act 2003, we are running a shorter seven day consultation period in which to seek views on the request, with the closing date for responses of **Tuesday 11 October 2016**.

Annex 2

Ofcom's consultation principles

A2.1 Ofcom has published the following seven principles that it will follow for each public written consultation:

Before the consultation

A2.2 Where possible, we will hold informal talks with people and organisations before announcing a big consultation to find out whether we are thinking in the right direction. If we do not have enough time to do this, we will hold an open meeting to explain our proposals shortly after announcing the consultation.

During the consultation

A2.3 We will be clear about who we are consulting, why, on what questions and for how long.

A2.4 We will make the consultation document as short and simple as possible with a summary of no more than two pages. We will try to make it as easy as possible to give us a written response. If the consultation is complicated, we may provide a shortened Plain English Guide for smaller organisations or individuals who would otherwise not be able to spare the time to share their views.

A2.5 We will consult for up to 10 weeks depending on the potential impact of our proposals.

A2.6 A person within Ofcom will be in charge of making sure we follow our own guidelines and reach out to the largest number of people and organisations interested in the outcome of our decisions. Ofcom's 'Consultation Champion' will also be the main person to contact with views on the way we run our consultations.

A2.7 If we are not able to follow one of these principles, we will explain why.

After the consultation

A2.8 We think it is important for everyone interested in an issue to see the views of others during a consultation. We would usually publish all the responses we have received on our website. In our statement, we will give reasons for our decisions and will give an account of how the views of those concerned helped shape those decisions.

Heartland Radio Foundation Ltd., t/a Heartland FM outlines criteria which it would satisfy in relation to this Format change request:

- (a) The Change would not substantially alter the character of the service save for improved and dedicated Perth and Perthshire relevant news and sports bulletins.
- (b) The departure would not narrow the range of programmes available as the programme service would continue to be relevant to persons living in the area for which the service is licensed to be provided.
- (c) The maintenance of fair and effective competition would continue as the licence area with an adult population of 60,000 is also served by Dundee based 96.4 Tay FM and 1584 Tay 2 AM which also transmit on the Tayside Dundee/Perth DAB digital radio multiplex.
- (d) Anecdotal evidence from advertisers and persons living in the area suggest that they would like to have an enhanced Perth and Perthshire news and sports service including updates on SPL club St Johnstone FC in Perth. This change will bring about the resources to meet the demand for Perth and Perthshire content. There will continue to be a Heartland FM studio base in Perth which can be used by the new licensee.

Of prime importance is the viability of the licensed service and the ability to maintain a relevant Perth and Perthshire programme service in the area to be served.

Resources will be available from Wave 102 Limited to ensure licence compliance and to offer an enhanced programme service for the Perth licence area.

The proposed change will offer 'Enhanced' local news services with increased story-count in news bulletins as provided by Wave 102.

Wave 102 Limited is committed to providing an enhanced local news service for the Perth area licence. A dedicated broadcast journalist will ensure timely and updated relevant Perth and Perthshire stories and sports bulletins. These enhanced news bulletins will be

broadcast throughout the peaktime on weekdays and at weekends.

The provision of local news bulletins during daytime, as well as peak-time, helps to ensure that the station's local content and identity is maintained during these daytime networked hours. This content will be most valued by listeners, and its delivery also benefits communities and local democracy.

Wave 102 FM Ltd outlines criteria which would satisfy in relation to this Format change:

- (a) The character of the service will not change but will editorially satisfy the 106.6 FM transmission area.
- (b) The departure would not narrow the range of programming but conversely improve the service to persons living in the area of Dundee and surrounding area.
- (c) The acquisition of the 106.6 FM licence would maintain fair and effective competition, as Wave would be broadcasting in an area covered by Tay FM on 96.4 FM and Tay 2 on 1584 kHz AM/MW.

Of prime importance is the viability of the Perth licence to maintain relevant programming to the area to be served. Wave 102 will provide a service which will be licence compliant and offer an enhanced programme service for the licenced area.

A commitment to local news covering the licensed areas;

A commitment to local sport including enhancing our sports offering;

Wave 102 would ensure local information would include, where appropriate travel information for commuter routes in the licensed area

The 106.6 licenced area has a vibrant cultural scene with Perth Concert Hall at Horsecross Arts being host to many concerts and performances of potential interest, content from which may provide enhanced listening for the new transmission area;

Advertisers with business outlets in both cities would benefit from coverage on the new frequency, as would advertisers who can now reach out to a larger audience from the 102 FM Dundee area;

This also gives the listener a bigger and wider choice of locally produced programmes within the 106.6 FM area to be served.
