Additional comments:

The opt out stickers will not be suitable for everyone. As I would not wish my parcels to be left with one particular neighbour but I am happy for a parcel to be left with other neighbours. I am also happy to receive parcels for most of my neighbours except one. If I use an opt out sticker to ensure that my parcels was not left with one particular neighbour this would mean that my parcel was not left with any other neighbours and I also would not be asked to take in any parcels for any of the other neighbours and this is not what I would want by displaying the sticker, re

Question 1:Do you agree that Ofcom should grant approval to Royal Mail for the Delivery to Neighbour service? If not please explain your answer.:

No. Unfortunately some neighbours do not get along with each other and therefore would not like parcels to be left with them. If a neighbour would like a parcel to be left with another neighbour a note can be left on their front door specifying the house number of the neighbour with whom they are happy with the parcel to be left. The neighbours who do this usually notify the other neighbour in advance they are expecting a parcel and they ask them if they will take the parcel in if they are at home. This has always worked well on our street.
