This will not be detrimental in anyway as we are increasing our outreach with outside broadcast capabilities and we are driving forward with further ilnks with youth organisations and schools

Over the summer months Felixstowe Radio has been dealing with major significant issues beyond the station's control.

One of the station's directors and a co-opted director had suddenly resigned and launched a competitor station in the direct broadcast area.

This was unprepared for due to these directors not informing us in advance of their launch

The competitor has headhunted some of our presenters and tech team to join them.

Our advertising rates have been undercut by them.

Member morale was damaged significantly by these actions and by inappropriate messages on social media. However this is now being rebuilt due to recruitment and improvements in our broadcast quality and sustainability.

Our FM signal is managed from antennae and servers housed in the local secondary school. Due to end of term technical activities including a reboot and issues with the firewall were dealt with by their tech team and this resulted in a drop out of our signal. This has now been rectified through actions to be independent from the school with our own servers and internet line in to

the school. Since this has been facilitated there have been no issues with connectivity and our output has significantly improved in quality.

Our Company Secretary has suffered from a sudden un-expected bereavement which has meant a delay in communication which has been very regrettable and unfortunate but also unavoidable.

Therefore our aims have been to-

- 1 Build up presenters/broadcast hours to retain our ability to meet our key commitments.
- 2 Build up our locally created broadcast hours.
- 3 Develop resilience and sustainability with new hardware and software being readily accessible and serviced.
- 4 Outside broadcast equipment purchased and more external events to be covered
- 5 Further funding to be raised to support sustainability and resilience.

Aim 1 is progressing well and supporting the improvement in aim 2. Aim 3 and 4 have been achieved and 5th is currently being progressed.

Ofcom notes on the request

The request was AGREED, because Ofcom was satisfied in relation to Section 106(1A)(a) of the Broadcasting Act 1990 (as modified by the Community Radio Order 2004, and further modified by the Community Radio (Amendment) Orders 2010 and 2015) i.e. that the change would not substantially alter the character of the service, and for the policy reasons given below.

The Licensee is requesting to convert its Key Commitments for original output and locally produced output from daily to weekly requirements, but also to reduce them from 8 hours per day (56 hours per week equivalent) and 13 hours per day (91 hours per week equivalent) to 35 hours per week and 63 hours per week respectively. These represent reductions of 38% and 31% respectively. In requesting these changes the Licensee has stated that the proposal will enable it "to build [the Licensee's] presenter portfolio and [its] software and hardware sustainability following a time of significant change".

While these are relatively large reductions, we consider that 35 hours per week of original output and 63 hours per week of locally-produced output should still be enough to ensure the station remains able to deliver on its Key Commitments to provide a "distinctive community radio service for the inhabitants of Felixstowe and the surrounding villages" and to "foster a sense of community amongst the local inhabitants by providing information about the local area, offering the local community a forum for the discussion of local issues". As such, we are satisfied these changes do not substantially alter the character of the service.

In terms of our policy criteria, Ofcom is satisfied the change will not affect the station's ability to meet the community radio 'characteristics of service' set out in the legislation, and there are no other policy reasons to refuse the change. We have therefore decided to exercise our discretion to approve this change.
