The holder of an analogue local commercial radio licence may apply to Ofcom to have the station's Format amended. Any application should be made using the layout shown on this form, and should be in accordance with Ofcom's published procedures for Format changes.¹

Under section 106(1A) of the Broadcasting Act 1990 (as amended), Ofcom may consent to a change of a Format only if it is satisfied that *at least* one of the following five statutory criteria is satisfied:

- (a) *that the departure would not substantially alter the character of the service;*
- (b) *that the departure would not narrow the range of programmes available by way of relevant independent radio services to persons living the area or locality for which the service is licensed to be provided;*
- (c) *that the departure would be conducive to the maintenance or promotion of fair and effective competition*
- (d) *that there is evidence that, amongst persons living in that area or locality, there is a significant demand for, or significant support for, the change that would result from the departure; or*
- (e) *that (i) the departure would result from programmes included in the licensed service ceasing to be made at premises in the area or locality for which the service is provided, but (ii) those programmes would continue to be made wholly or partly at premises within the approved area (as defined in section 314 of the Communications Act 2003 (local content and character of services)).*

Only one of these five criteria need be satisfied in order for Ofcom to consent to the proposed change. However, even if Ofcom is of the opinion that the proposed change satisfies one or more of the statutory criteria, there may be reasons (depending on the particular circumstances of the case) why Ofcom may not consent to the proposed change. The additional criteria to which Ofcom will have regard when exercising this discretion can be found on our website.²

Applicants should note that, under section 106ZA of the same Act (as amended), a proposed change that *does not* satisfy the first or last of these criteria (i.e. a change that Ofcom considers *would* or *could* substantially alter the character of the service, or does not relate to the origin of locally-made programmes) must, if it is to be considered further under any of the other three criteria, be consulted upon.

Ofcom notes on the request

Statutory requirements

This request relates to the FM licence for Greater Manchester held by Key 103 Ltd, currently broadcasting as 'Hits Radio'.

Every FM local commercial radio service is required to broadcast a certain amount of locally-made programming, which is specified in its Format. Locally-made programmes are those made within a station's licensed area or, where Ofcom has approved a wider area relating to that station, that 'approved area.' The approved area relating to all the licensed services involved in this request is North West England.

Following changes to Ofcom's localness guidelines published in October 2018, Key 103 Ltd has requested the following changes to the Format of the Greater Manchester licence:

- To change the music format wording in the 'Character of Service' from "contemporary and chart music" to "mainstream popular music".
- To share local programming hours with the FM licences for Merseyside and Preston & Blackpool.
- To broadcast the locally-made programming hours from anywhere within the approved area of North West England.
- To reduce the required number of locally-made programming hours on weekday daytimes from seven to three, and from four to none on weekend days.

These proposed changes would change the character of service as set out in the Format of the licence, and accordingly can be agreed only if Ofcom is satisfied in regard to one of the statutory criteria set out in section 106(1A) of the Broadcasting Act 1990 (as set out in the request, above).

If we are satisfied in relation to one of the statutory criteria, we are then able to decide whether or not to approve the request, taking account of our published policy criteria.

Assessment

With regard to the request to broadcast locally-made programming hours from anywhere within the approved area of North West England, Ofcom was satisfied in relation to section 106(1A)(e) of the Broadcasting Act 1990, on the basis that the change requested, if approved, would result in programmes included in the licensed service being made at premises with the North West England approved area.

In considering the request concerning locally-made hours, we were satisfied in relation to section 106(1A)(a) – that the reduction in the number of locally-made hours would not substantially alter the character of the service. This is because the proposed new amount of locally-made programming is consistent with our recently amended [localness guidelines](#), and in addition because we would continue to expect the licensee to provide a local service that includes, as well as the level of local news specified in its Format, sufficient other local material to deliver the character of service, regardless of where the content is being broadcast from.

We were also satisfied in relation to section 106(1A)(a) with regard to the request to share all local programming hours with the Merseyside licence (AL00079) and the Preston & Blackpool licence (AL00093). Again, this request is consistent with our localness guidelines, and we would continue to expect the licensee to provide a local service that includes sufficient local material relevant to listeners in its individual licensed area to deliver the required character of service.

With regard to the request to change the wording of the character of service, we were satisfied in relation to section 106(1A)(a) – that the change to the wording would not substantially alter the character of the service. Our 2015 [Review of music in radio Formats](#) stated that licensees wanting to change their music Format from genre descriptions including ‘Contemporary Hit Music’ and ‘Chart Music’ to ‘mainstream popular music’ would not be considered to be a change to the character of service and could be approved without the need for the request to be considered in accordance with the statutory Format change process.

As a matter of [general policy](#), we are content to approve Format change requests relating to locally-made programming and programme sharing which are consistent with our published localness guidelines on these matters.

Decision

Ofcom decided to approve this Format change request from Key 103 Ltd because we were satisfied in relation to two of the relevant statutory criteria, and for the policy reason outlined above.
