1 Report Summary

On 29 July 2024, three young girls – Alice Aguiar, Elsie Dot Stancombe, and Bebe King – were murdered by Axel Rudakubana, a teenager who stabbed them and injured ten others in a horrific attack in Southport. In the aftermath, high-profile hate figures on social media platforms like Elon Musk's X falsely linked the attack to Muslims and migrants, leading to widespread disorder and violent riots across the UK. Research from the Center for Countering Digital Hate (CCDH) found that these hateful influencers garnered millions of views per day on X.¹ The X platform utterly failed to moderate this explosion of dangerous, violent content.² CCDH's findings led the UK's online safety regulator Ofcom to conclude that there was a "clear connection" between posts on social media and the eruption of the 2024 riots.³

One year on from the 2024 riots, new CCDH research finds that little has changed

This study revisits six accounts on the X platform that CCDH identified as having posted influential hate and falsehoods surrounding the Southport attack. It finds that the same forms of violent and murderous rhetoric that precipitated and enflamed the 2024 riots are still widely circulating, with scant moderation by the platform.

Thousands of calls for violence are in reply to just six hateful influencers

The research shows how posts from six hate influencers – Tommy Robinson, Paul Golding, Ashlea Simon, Andrew Tate, Laurence Fox and Calvin Robinson – are the initial "parent" posts in an intensely violent series of replies from platform users. Reply posts encourage extreme acts of violence against Muslims and migrants: to shoot, to maim, and to kill.

X amplifies and monetises hateful influencers despite continued breaches of platform rules

This study makes clear the role of the social media platform X: harbouring these hate influencers, amplifying and monetising their dangerous content, and failing to enforce their own prohibitions against violent incitement as stated in conduct rules.⁴

Social media platforms like X have learnt nothing from the 2024 summer riots

The report contrasts the 2024 summer riots with the 2025 Liverpool parade car crash. Merseyside Police chose to share the ethnicity and nationality of the suspect in the Liverpool crash in an attempt to prevent false claims about either from gaining traction on social media and leading to offline violence, as happened following the Southport stabbing.⁵ Unlike Merseyside Police, the X platform treated the 2025 Liverpool crash no differently than they treated the 2024 Southport stabbings – amplifying false incendiary information and failing to fact-check (or "Community Note") the vast majority of false claims about the Liverpool victory parade car crash.

2 Introduction from Imran Ahmed

One year ago, during a Taylor Swift–themed dance class attended by 26 young people, a 17-year-old British citizen walked into the studio and murdered three children: seven-year-old Elsie Dot Stancombe, six-year-old Bebe King, and nine-year-old Alice Aguiar. Ten others were injured in the attack.

In a moment of utter shock and mourning across the UK, a few high-profile hate-filled figures sought to swiftly hijack the tragedy to spread false claims online, by falsely identifying the perpetrator as a Muslim asylum seeker. These lies spread rapidly and widely on social media platforms, in particular X, fuelling violent anti-migrant and anti-Muslim riots across the UK.



In August 2024, CCDH reported that while affected communities and local authorities struggled to contain the violence both online and offline, social media platforms stood by and, in some cases, financially profited from the terror of these events.⁶ X, in particular, emerged as a crucial vector of false information and hate. Rather than taking steps to mitigate harmful and illegal content, Elon Musk, owner of X, personally amplified conspiracy theories, warning of an impending “civil war” in Britain to his hundreds of millions of followers.⁷

Our researchers also found that hate preachers who had been banned from Twitter before being reinstated by Musk were receiving millions of views per day.⁸ The platform was monetising their hate, running ads alongside content inciting violence, including posts encouraging mobs to “permanently remove Islam from Great Britain.”⁹

One year on, we return to ask: what has changed? Have any of the accounts that spread lies and fuelled real-world violence faced consequences?

What we found is deeply disturbing.

Of the six prominent accounts identified by CCDH in the wake of the riots (Tommy Robinson, Paul Golding, Ashlea Simon, Laurence Fox, Andrew Tate, and Calvin Robinson), we found that each remains active on X. Today, their posts are still routinely followed by streams of replies containing threats, incitements to violence, and open expressions of hatred toward Muslims and migrants. These appear to remain largely unchecked, despite clearly violating X’s own rules which prohibit such harmful content.

This new research makes one thing clear: one year on from the Southport riots, X remains the crucial hub for hate-filled lies and incitement of violence targeting migrants and Muslims. Anti-migrant and anti-Muslim influencers such as Tommy Robinson continue to play a central role in triggering waves of violent rhetoric. Their posts serve as rallying points for other hateful extremists, all too often leading to real-world harm.

This cannot be allowed to continue. Social media platforms must be held accountable and compelled to enforce their own rules with consistency and integrity. If they fail to do so, governments have a responsibility to step in by introducing and enforcing strong regulation that confronts the profit-driven amplification of violent and hateful content. Without intervention, the cycle of hate and violence will not just persist, it will deepen. The harm to targeted communities will grow and metastasize, with devastating consequences for British society and for all our communities.

3 Key Findings

CCDH identified 4,379 X posts promoting violence against migrants or Muslims

- Researchers revisited six hateful influencers who posted falsehoods and hate during the summer disorder of 2024.¹⁰
- This study finds that their posts on X are often followed with streams of replies promoting violence toward Muslims or migrants, including calls to kill.
- Using an AI model, researchers identified 4,379 violent replies targeting Muslims or migrants posted in response to 322 posts from the six accounts in the past year.¹¹

X claims to prohibit posts promoting violence

- The 4,379 violent replies identified contained incitement to violence, threats of violence, and expressions of desire for violence.¹² Examples include:
 - “We need to shoot them at the point of entry, as they unload from the dinghies.”¹³
 - “Dont deport them, let them come in and i will shot them all”¹⁴
 - “I would like to go postal on the Muslims! They are evil as hell!”¹⁵
- This type of violent speech is all prohibited by X with the platform’s rules explicitly banning content that “threatens, incites, glorifies, or expresses desire for violence or harm.”¹⁶

X is enabling hate by allowing key hateful accounts to benefit from X Premium

- All six accounts previously linked to the summer 2024 disorder are verified with a ‘blue tick’, which means they benefit from boosted reply visibility and advanced content tools.¹⁷
- Three of the accounts are allowed to offer paid subscriptions, enabling them to profit from their content.¹⁸

X is still failing to respond to hateful and misleading claims in emergency situations

- Despite law enforcement’s updated strategy of transparent communication after a car struck spectators at Liverpool’s victory parade, false claims thrived on X.
- False and misleading claims about the event reached 29 million views, often exceeding the reach of credible sources like Sky News and Merseyside Police.¹⁹
- Only 2 of 55 false or misleading posts displayed Community Notes.²⁰

4 Violent Posts

CCDH identified over 4,000 posts promoting violence toward Muslims or migrants

This study revisits six accounts that CCDH previously identified as having posted influential hate and falsehoods on the social media platform X in the run-up to the disorder in summer 2024: Tommy Robinson, Paul Golding, Ashlea Simon, Andrew Tate, Laurence Fox and Calvin Robinson.²¹

It finds that in the year since the disorder occurred, their posts on X are often followed with streams of replies containing threats, calls for violence, and expressions of desire for violence directed towards Muslims and migrants.

In total, CCDH identified 4,379 reply posts promoting violence towards Muslims or migrants that appear in response to 322 X posts from the six accounts. These reply posts amassed at least 383,102 views in total and encourage extreme acts of violence, including calls to shoot, to maim, and to kill.²²

The violent posts target Muslims and migrants in differing ways. Some promote violence against broad groups, such as calls for violence against all Muslims or against certain groups of migrants such as asylum seekers. Others promote violence toward specific individuals, usually in response to an individual named in the parent post.

Researchers used AI to identify violent posts in three main categories:

1. **Incitement to violence**, such as: "We need to shoot them at the point of entry, as they unload from the dinghies."²³
2. **Threats of violence**, such as: "Dont deport them, let them come in and i will shot them all"²⁴
3. **Expressions of a desire for violence**, such as: "I would like to go postal on the Muslims! They are evil as hell!"²⁵

All three of these types of violent post are explicitly banned by X, with the platform's rules stating that it does not allow content that "threatens, incites, glorifies, or expresses desire for violence or harm."²⁶ X further claims that they may remove or reduce the visibility of such content to, "ensure the safety of our users and prevent the normalization or glorification of violent actions."²⁷

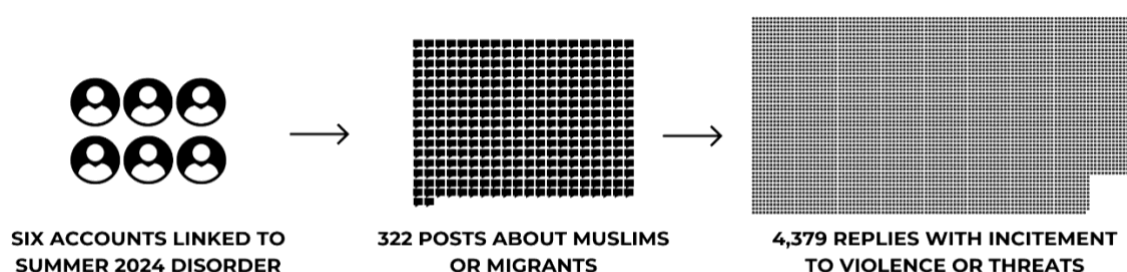
The findings of this study show that, one year on from the violent unrest of 2024, X remains a hub for violent speech towards migrants and Muslims. It quantifies the keystone role that anti-Muslim and anti-migrant influencers like Tommy Robinson play in triggering a series of violent calls from other users in replies to their posts.

How researchers identified 4,379 violent replies

Violent reply posts were studied using AI to analyse the replies to posts mentioning Muslims or migrants from six accounts that were previously identified by CCDH as posting falsehoods or hate during the summer disorder of 2024.²⁸

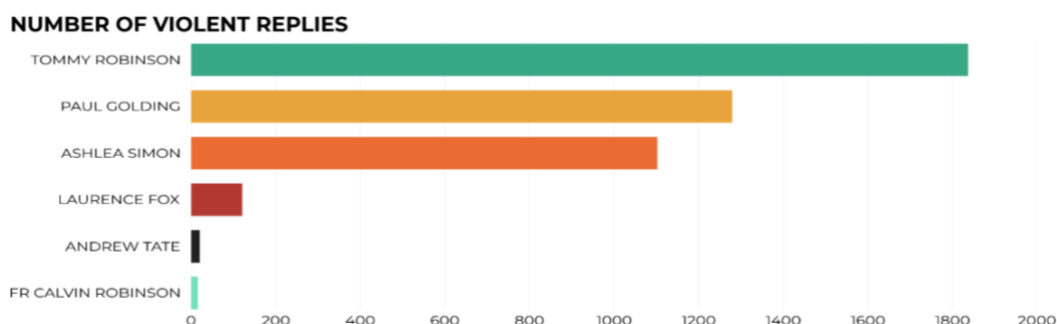
Researchers started by identifying posts from the six influential accounts that had over 250,000 views and contained keywords about Muslims or migrants, identifying a total of 322 such posts. They then analysed replies to these “parent posts”, meaning the original post to which others respond, identifying a total of 4,379 violent replies.

The parent posts with violent replies were overwhelmingly anti-migrant or anti-Muslim in sentiment, often calling for mass deportations, containing negative depictions of Islam, or including examples of criminal behaviour purportedly carried out by either Muslims or migrants.



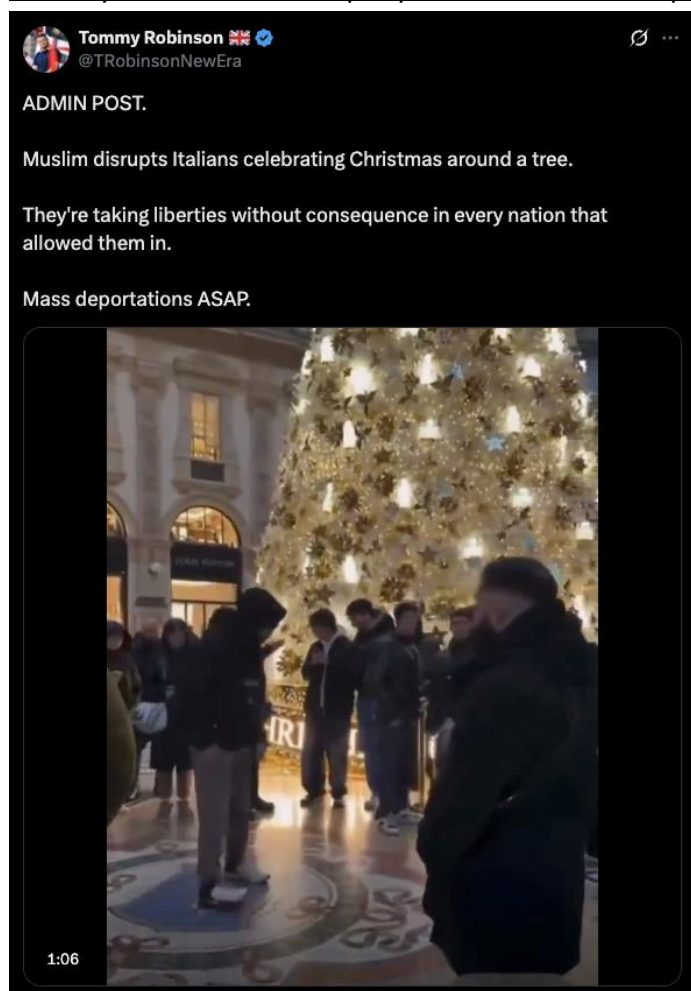
The AI system used for the analysis was designed to detect the promotion of violence towards Muslims or migrants in the context of post replies. The system worked with a high level of accuracy: our testing found that replies it flagged as promoting violence were identified correctly 95% of the time. Further details can be found in Appendix: Methodology at the end of this report.

Overall, most replies promoting violence were found under parent posts by Tommy Robinson with 1,838 violent replies, followed by Paul Golding with 1,280 violent replies, Ashlea Simon with 1,103 violent replies, Laurence Fox with 121 violent replies, Andrew Tate with 21 violent replies, and Calvin Robinson with 16 violent replies.



The next section shows an example of how a parent post by Tommy Robinson prompted violent replies. Examples for each of the other accounts can be found in an appendix.

5 Key Accounts

Six key accounts studied still enjoy privileges on X despite role in 2024 disorder

The six accounts at the core of this study continue to subscribe to X Premium, awarding them the privileges of 'blue tick' verification status, and three offer paid subscriptions, despite playing a role in fanning the flames of the summer 2024 disorder.

CCDH previously identified the following six accounts for spreading false claims about the Southport attacker's identity.³⁰ Online rumours suggesting that the attacker was Muslim or a migrant reportedly fuelled subsequent violence, including attacks on mosques and asylum seeker accommodations.³¹ Each of the six influencers posted at least once on X making false claims about the attacker or inciting hatred toward Muslims or migrants during the unrest:

- **Tommy Robinson**, a far-right anti-Islam activist, who posted a video about the Southport attack with the caption: "There's more evidence to suggest islam is a mental health issue rather than a religion of peace."³²
- **Paul Golding**, co-leader of Britain First who posted "the evidence is stacking up that the Southport attack was carried out by a migrant".³³
- **Ashlea Simon**, co-leader of Britain First who said "We all know who's responsible for the Southport attack. White Christian teens don't stab children, Islamists do."³⁴
- **Andrew Tate**, a misogynistic influencer whose post stating "ILLEGAL MIGRANT STABS 6 LITTLE GIRLS. WAKE UP." received 15.2 million views.³⁵
- **Laurence Fox**, a former GB News presenter who reacted to news of the attack by posting "we need to permanently remove Islam from Great Britain."³⁶
- **Calvin Robinson**, another former GB News presenter who posted during the disorder that "Islam is evil and needs removing from the UK."³⁷

All the accounts retain verified 'blue tick' status which shows they pay X to have access to X Premium benefits like boosted reply visibility and advanced content tools. X has also allowed three of these users – Laurence Fox, Calvin Robinson, and Andrew Tate – the ability to offer subscriptions, enabling them to profit from their content.³⁸

This is despite X's guidelines which state that premium accounts can lose their 'blue tick' for going against X's rules, including posting hateful content, such as using fearful stereotypes or dehumanizing language.³⁹ Not only did these accounts play a role in inspiring the summer 2024 disorder, but they have also posted hateful content that violates X's guidelines in the year since. Examples of violating posts are in the following section.

6 Case Study: Liverpool victory parade car crash

Recent incident shows that X is still allowing divisive claims to spread unchecked

On 26th May 2025, a driver struck spectators during Liverpool's Premier League victory parade.⁴⁶ The incident left 50 people injured, with several sent to hospital.⁴⁷

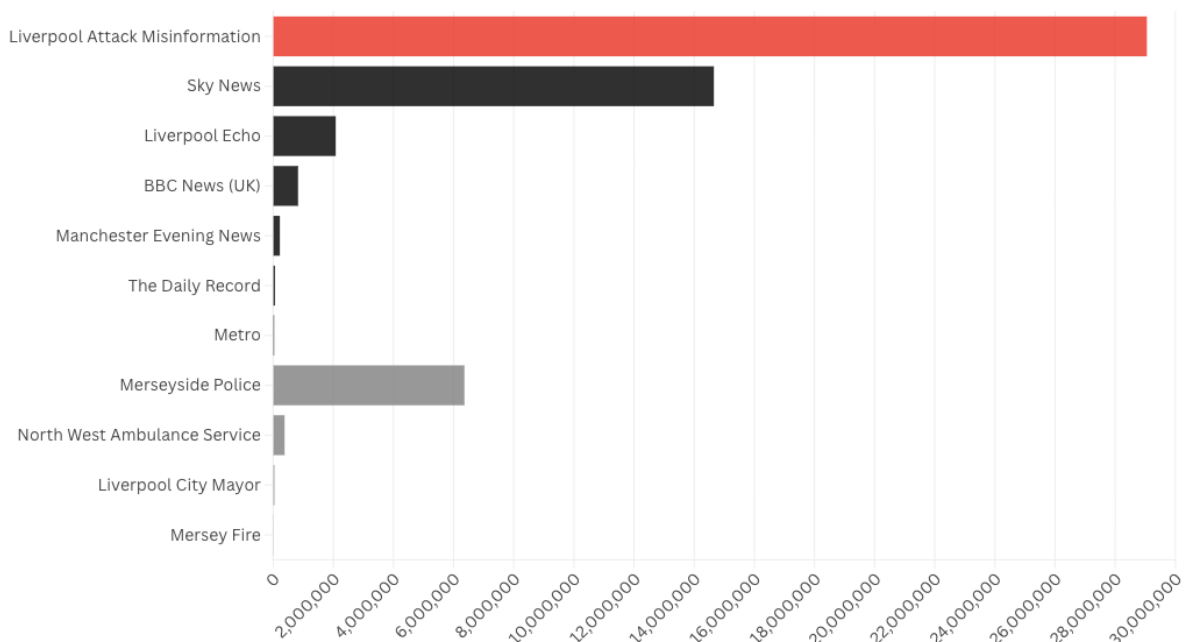
Recognising the potential for further harm from the spread of conspiracies, speculation and false information, Merseyside Police swiftly shared details of the suspect's ethnicity and nationality, stating that the suspect was a "53-year-old white British man from the Liverpool area".⁴⁸

This reflects an adapted approach from the police in light of the summer 2024 disorder, with official advice stating that police forces "must provide a true narrative online to reach people who may be searching for information" to help prevent future disorder.⁴⁹

The response was also praised by Liverpool's mayor, who emphasised that it was important for Merseyside Police to act quickly to quell speculation and misinformation, saying: "The speculation was that it was part of something much bigger... the police acted very, very quickly, really swiftly, to put paid to some of that speculation."⁵⁰

Despite new police strategy, misleading claims still reached 29 million views on X

How views on **misinformation about the Liverpool crash** compare to views on credible sources



Despite Merseyside Police's decision to act quickly, false and misleading claims about the Liverpool crash still reached 29 million views on X, often exceeding the reach of credible news sources like Sky News and Merseyside Police.

The research shows that even when the police provided timely information, this did not prevent X becoming a space where divisive false and misleading claims were able to spread unchecked to reach large numbers of views.⁵¹ While credible information was available, many were still being exposed to false or misleading claims.

In total, researchers identified 55 posts from the two days after the crash that contained false and misleading claims about the perpetrator. These 55 posts were collectively viewed 29 million times.⁵² Credible posts examined for this case study received 24.7 million views, including posts from news sources with 17.9 million views and posts from official sources and emergency services with 6.8 million views.⁵³

Misleading claims about the incident fell broadly into the following themes:

1. That the police were trying to cover up the truth about the perpetrator
2. That that the person in the vehicle was not actually white nor 53 years old
3. A conspiracy that a man involved in a separate incident was the one arrested

Not only did the misleading claims reach high numbers of views, but just two of the 55 false and misleading posts displayed Community Notes, showing that X's crowdsourced fact-checking system is not working consistently.

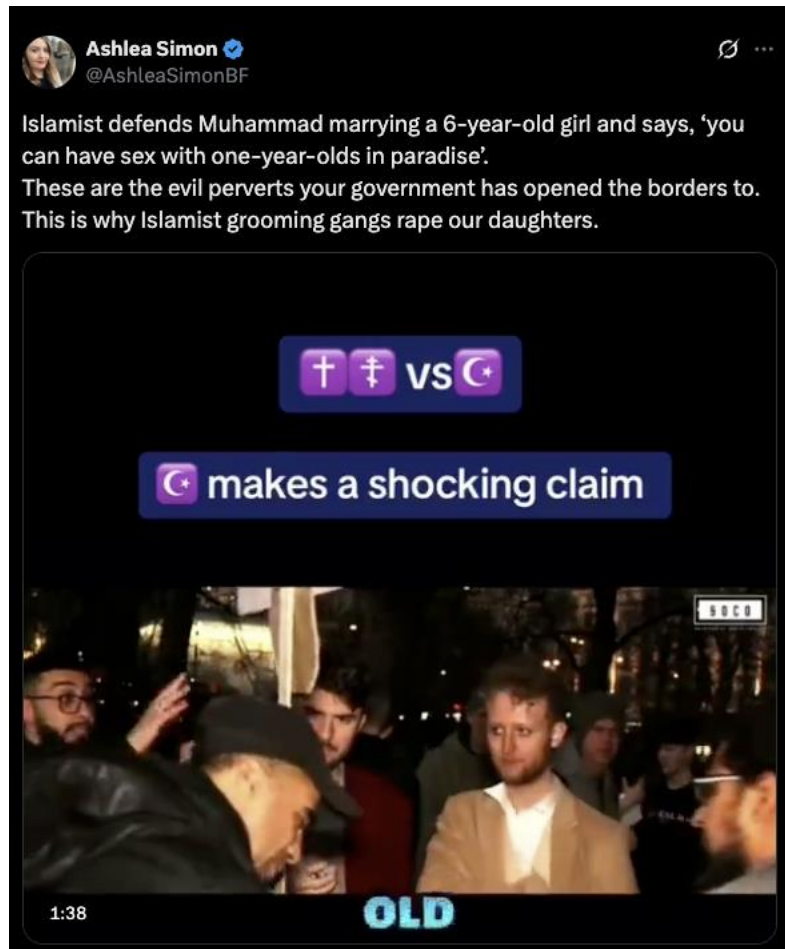
Comparing virality of misinformation to credible sources

CCDH researchers compared how false and misleading claims about the Liverpool attack performed in the two days after the attack when compared to content from more reliable sources like news and emergency response accounts.

News sites in the comparison were chosen by looking at the UK news sites with the highest web traffic that also achieved high scores from NewsGuard, a rating system that judges news reliability.⁵⁴ Estimates for views on their relevant X posts were calculated by aggregating the views on posts containing keywords about the attack.

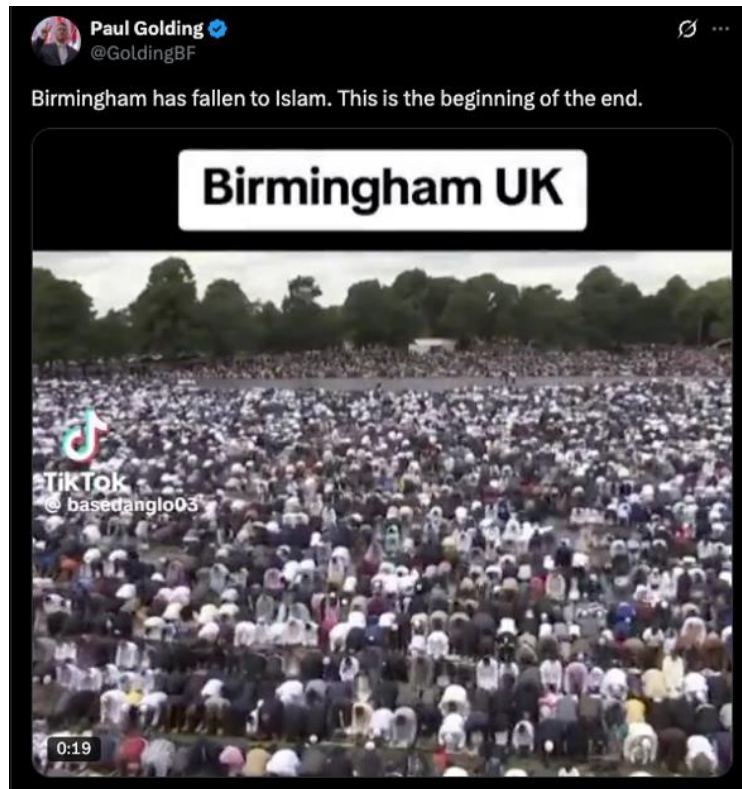

Appendix: Example Liverpool crash posts

This appendix contains examples of false or misleading claims about the identity of the suspect behind the Liverpool parade car crash on 26 May 2025. False or misleading posts about the crash studied by this report amassed 29 million views in total.

- This post with 3.1 million views promotes a false claim that the driver in the Liverpool car crash incident was not a 53-year-old white male but a young person who was not white, claiming that it was a “coverup” and the media has been “caught lying”.⁶⁰ This post did not have a community note until 5 days after the incident and it already had 1.6m views less than 24 hours after it was posted⁶¹.



- This post, with 3.8 million views, does not have a community note and claims that the 53-year-old man arrested was involved in another incident and was not the driver of the car. Saying that there is something “they’re obviously not telling us”.⁶²



- This post, which has almost 1 million views and no community note, says that the driver of the car looks “mid to late 20’s and foreign’. They ask where this was “intentional” or “planned”.⁶³



Appendix: Methodology

This appendix outlines the methodology used to develop the findings of this report, including the terms used to identify posts for study, how violent threats were identified using AI, and how false or misleading posts about the Liverpool crash were identified.

Studying parent posts from six accounts about Muslims and migrants

To analyse a set of relevant posts, researchers used a licensed third-party tool to study posts from six accounts filtered down by keywords related to migrants and Muslims.

The study was designed to capture activity on X in the time since the summer 2024 disorder. As such, posts in the study were from 9 August 2024 through to 28 May 2025, where the 9 August was chosen as a start date as the disorder had stopped by this stage and there had already been 600 arrests.⁶⁴ Researchers focussed only on those posts that reached over 250,000 views.

Identifying violent threats in replies using AI

Using the same licensed third-party tool, researchers studied replies to all the parent posts about Muslims or migrants, resulting in an overall analysis of 700k replies. Researchers analysed these reply posts using an AI-assisted system that was built to identify posts promoting violence towards Muslims or migrants.

To identify violent posts accurately and efficiently, the AI system used a two-stage process. Firstly, a lightweight model, OpenAI's GPT-4o-mini, scanned all replies to flag those most likely to contain violent content. Subsequently, a more powerful model, GPT-4o, reviewed this high-risk subset in detail. This approach allowed researchers to focus on the most serious cases while keeping the process resource efficient. It also made it possible to refine the second stage specifically for the replies that were most likely to contain the promotion of violence toward migrants or Muslims, improving both precision and reliability.

In the second stage, GPT-4o is prompted to assign a 0 to 10 risk score to each high-risk reply. Researchers refined this prompt using a labelled sample of 400 replies,

with positive examples representing violent threats targeted at Muslims or migrants and negative examples representing replies that either did not contain violent threats or the targets of a violent threat were not Muslims or migrants. Based on this refinement and empirical testing, a classification threshold of 8 was chosen as it provided the best balance between capturing true violent threats and minimizing false positives.

Overall, the two-stage system results in an F1 score of 80%. An F1 score is used to measure a model's accuracy and is a weighted average of the following two metrics:

- **Precision:** the number of posts labelled as belonging to a category by the model that were actually correct.
- **Recall:** the number of posts for a category that were correctly identified by the model as belonging to that category.

The precision score was 95%, meaning when the model identified a post as a violent threat towards migrants or Muslims, it was correct 95% of the time. Recall was 68%, meaning out of every 100 violent threats, the model successfully found about 68.

These accuracy scores are based on a weighted analysis of 400 high-risk replies and 400 lower risk replies. The scores indicate that the model was extremely accurate when positively identifying a post as containing a violent threat, but did miss a number of posts that should have been identified as violent. This should make the numbers used throughout our report conservative estimates of the scale of violent threats.

In total, this methodology identified 4,379 replies that promote violence against Muslims or migrants that were posted in response to 322 'parent posts' from the six key accounts studied. View figures were available for just 517 of the 4,379 violent replies in our study. Those 517 posts amassed 383,102 views in total.

How researchers identified false and misleading posts about Liverpool car crash event

The Liverpool car crash incident occurred at 6pm on the 26 May 2025.⁶⁵ To find relevant posts, a third-party tool was used to study posts based on a keyword search query likely to identify false or misleading claims around the incident. Posts studied were from the hour before the incident through 28 May 2025.

The top 1,000 posts by views were reviewed and classed based on whether they contained false or misleading claims concerning the driver of the incident. Each post classed as false or misleading was then checked by an additional researcher to

confirm that it was correctly categorised. This led to a final set of 55 posts with total of 29m views that were classed as false or misleading.

How researchers compared the false and misleading posts to trusted sources

To understand how the spread of false or misleading claims from the Liverpool incident compared to reliable news sources, posts were studied using a third-party tool from top UK news sites and emergency responders. These posts were studied over a similar timeframe as the false and misleading Liverpool posts, from the time of the incident at 6pm on 26 May 2025 through 28 May 2025.

To analyse the views on trusted news sites, researchers created a list of 6 large, reliable news sites and estimated the number of views on their posts about the Liverpool car crash incident. To create this list, researchers selected the biggest news sites by traffic in the UK during May that had a NewsGuard "reliability" score of over 90. Data on the top UK news sites by traffic was based on statistics from Semrush.⁶⁶ NewsGuard's scores assess sources based on a set of apolitical criteria of journalistic practice, with a high score reflecting strong reliability.⁶⁷ To get an estimate of the number of views each publication received on posts about the Liverpool incident, researchers gathered all posts from these outlets between the same time period and filtered using the keyword "Liverpool" along with any of the following keywords: car, parade, crash, incident.

These keywords were derived by analysing the 200 most frequently occurring words across all studied posts and selecting the terms relevant to the incident. This allowed researchers to focus on content likely to be related to the event in Liverpool and calculate the total views per outlet for comparative analysis.

To analyse the views on posts by emergency responders, all posts on X were studied from four accounts which were likely to provide accurate, real-time information during the incident. These accounts were Merseyside Police, Merseyside Fire & Rescue Service, North West Ambulance Service and the Mayor of the Liverpool City Region, Steve Rotheram.

Researchers were able to confirm that the keyword approach performed with a high level of accuracy by testing a random sample of 300 newspaper posts. The random sample was made up of 150 posts that were identified as pertaining to the incident through keywords and 150 that were not to ensure that there was a representative sample of both outcomes.

Researchers then manually labelled whether they were related to the Liverpool incident or not. These labels were compared to posts identified using the keywords approach, resulting in an overall F1 Score of 96% with a precision of 99% and a recall of 93%.
