1. Overview

Local TV Limited ("Local TV") holds a number of local digital television programme service licences across the UK. The services provided under these licences must meet specific content obligations set out in the licence, known as 'programming commitments'.

Local TV Limited has made a request to Ofcom to change the programming commitments in seven of its licences, as follows:

- Birmingham TV
- Bristol TV
- Cardiff TV
- Leeds TV
- Liverpool TV
- Tyne and Wear TV
- Teesside TV

What we are proposing – in brief

We have decided that, in each case, the changes requested by Local TV Limited amount to a departure from the character of the licensed service. This notice sets out details of Local TV's proposals and invites representation from people who may be affected by these changes.

We have taken a preliminary view on the requests. We are minded to grant them for the reasons outlined in this document. However, we are seeking views on the requests before we make final decisions. The period for making representations closes at **5pm on 05 April 2022.**

2. Details and background information

- 2.1 Local TV Limited submitted these requests to Ofcom on 18 January 2022 in relation to seven of its local digital television programme service ("L-DTPS") licences.
- 2.2 The seven licences are those for Birmingham, Bristol, Cardiff, Leeds, Liverpool, Teesside and Tyne and Wear.
- 2.3 The licence for each local TV service contains a set of programming commitments, which describe the type and volume of locally-relevant programming which the licensees are required to provide. These commitments are made by the licensee as part of their application for the licence.
- 2.4 Licensees can ask Ofcom to change their programming commitments in accordance with their licence conditions and relevant statutory provisions. These are described below.
- 2.5 These variation requests concern the programming commitments which reflect the character of the licensed service, particularly those relating to first-run local programming (including local news and current affairs programming).
- 2.6 We will take into account all representations made in response to this notice (whether they concern individual services or all of the requests taken as a whole) in deciding whether or not to consent to the requested changes. Ofcom will make individual decisions for each of the seven requested variations.
- 2.7 In this section, we set out:
 - a) the legal framework applicable to Ofcom's consideration of changes to programming commitments in L-DTPS licences;
 - b) an overview of the changes requested by Local TV Limited.

Legal Framework

- 2.8 Section 19(3A)(c) of the Broadcasting Act 1996 (the "Act") requires Ofcom to include in L-DTPS licences conditions for securing that the character of the licensed service, as proposed by the licence holder when making the application for that licence, is maintained for the duration of the licence.
- 2.9 We therefore include in condition 5(1) of every L-DTPS licence a requirement that, for the duration of the licence, the licensee must maintain the character of the licensed service in accordance with the programming commitments set out in the licence.
- 2.10 The circumstances in which we may allow a change to the character of the licensed service are limited by section 19(3B) of the Act. As a result, condition 5(2) of all L-DTPS licences provides that Ofcom may, following the procedure set out in the Act, only consent to a departure from the character of the licensed service if it is satisfied that:
 - a) The departure would not substantially alter the character of the licensed service;
 - b) The departure would not unacceptably reduce the number and range of programmes about the area or locality for which the service is licensed;

- c) The departure would not unacceptably reduce the number of programmes made in the area of locality for which the service is licensed; and
- d) The service would continue to meet the needs of the area or locality for which the service is licensed.
- 2.11 Before deciding whether to consent to a departure from the character of a licensed service on any of the grounds set out above, Ofcom is required by section 19(3C) of the Act to publish a notice specifying:
 - a) The proposed departure; and
 - b) The period in which representations may be made to Ofcom about the proposal. This period must end later than 28 days after the publication of this notice.
- 2.12 This document constitutes that notice.

The Variation Requests

2.13 The quantitative changes requested by Local TV Limited for each of the seven licences are summarised in the table below:

- 2.14 In addition, Local TV Limited has proposed some amendments to the qualitative "programming output" section of each of the programming commitments. Non-confidential versions of each variation request can be found at Annex A5.
- 2.15 Ofcom considered that the amendments requested in the variation requests would, in each case, amount to a departure from the character of the service. The effect of the requests is to reduce the amount of local first-run programming (including local news and current affairs programming), which may result in more non-local content being broadcast on the service and thus change the 'character of service.' Ofcom is therefore issuing a public consultation seeking views on the variation requests.

3. Consideration of the Variation Requests

- 3.1 As set out in section 2 of this consultation, Ofcom may allow a change to the character of a licensed local TV service if it is satisfied that the criteria set out in section 19(3B) of the Act are met. This section of the consultation document sets out:
 - a) a summary of Local TV Limited's reasons for making the Variation Requests;
 - b) Ofcom's approach to considering the requests; and,
 - c) our preliminary view on the Variation Requests, having regard to the statutory criteria.

Local TV's reasons for the Variation Requests

- 3.2 Local TV Limited has stated that the purpose of the variation requests is to "standardise requirements across licences it holds, as well as bringing Local TV's commitments in line with other LTVN [Local TV Network] providers."
- 3.3 Local TV Limited argues it is committed to serving local audiences and will "continue its structure of rolling local news, sports and entertainment," and that "audiences can expect just as much local content as they have always had, with content better serving audiences through greater flexibility within the schedule."

Ofcom's approach

- 3.4 In considering these requests, we have been mindful of the cumulative effect of the various different changes set out in the variation requests, together with the original commitments proposed by the relevant licensee when the licences were first awarded.
- 3.5 We also had regard to our <u>May 2012 statement</u> which set out how we intended to exercise our powers and duties to license new local television services. It outlines our minimum expectation for broadcast local news coverage, namely that "we would be unlikely to consider less than seven hours in total of broadcast news per week to be too burdensome for even the smallest L-DTPS licensee..." (page 5, section 1.47).
- 3.6 We had regard to this statement when considering the requests relating to the proposed reductions in first-run local programming. In its requests, Local TV Limited proposes that its commitment to first-run local programming is reduced by 43% for the Bristol, Cardiff, Leeds, Tyne and Wear and Teesside services, and a slightly smaller reduction of 40% for the Birmingham and Liverpool services (as their current commitments are slightly higher).
- 3.7 We also note that in respect of first-run local news and current affairs programming, the requests for the Liverpool and Teesside services is to reduce this to eight hours per week, and for the Birmingham service to 10.5 hours per week. No change is proposed for the Bristol, Cardiff, Leeds or Tyne & Wear services, which will remain at eight hours per week.

Ofcom's preliminary view

- 3.8 We are minded to consent to each of the requests from Local TV Limited because in our preliminary view the proposed variations would:
 - not substantially alter the character of the licensed service;
 - not unacceptably reduce the number and range of programmes about the area or locality for which the service is licensed;
 - not unacceptably reduce the number of programmes made in the area of locality for which the service is licensed; and
 - continue to meet the needs of the area or locality for which the service is licensed.
- 3.9 We have also had regard to the sustainability of these services. This is an important factor; Ofcom is prepared to support the local TV sector by being flexible when considering reduction requests relating to programming commitments.
- 3.10 We recognise, however, that this needs to be balanced against the fact that reductions in commitments run the risk of increasing the volume of non-local content being broadcast on the services.
- 3.11 What follows is an explanation of our rationale for our preliminary view against each of the relevant statutory criteria.

Ground (a): that the departure would not substantially alter the character of the service

- 3.12 In its proposal, Local TV Limited argues that:
 - it is committed to serving local audiences, covering news, sport, and entertainment within the local area. It will continue its structure of rolling local news, sports and entertainment, so the character of service across the licences will not substantially change; and that
 - audiences can still expect just as much local content as they have always had, with content better serving audiences through greater flexibility within the schedule.
- 3.13 After careful consideration, we are of the view that the amount of local programming required to be provided by each service would still be sufficiently high to deliver the minimum expected amount of local content as articulated in our statement of May 2012, and that there would still remain a commitment to delivering first-run local news and current affairs.
- 3.14 In respect of each service, we consider that most viewers would be unlikely to notice any significant change to the service. The proposals would still commit the licensee to broadcast a substantial proportion of its local programming within peak hours, thus maintaining the characters of service for all licences. While the total volume of first-run local programming would be reduced, we appreciate that the repetitive nature of the programming output would also reduce, resulting in better quality of news and current affairs being offered to viewers in the first instance.
- 3.15 We note that Local TV Limited has proposed a reduction of more than 50% in its commitment to broadcast repeats of local content. Although we acknowledge that repeated content allows viewers to 'catch up' on the local content provided by the licensed

- service, and such content therefore has a role in defining the character of the service, this is likely to be less important and have less of an impact than securing an acceptable amount of first-run local programming. We therefore consider that this proposed reduction in repeat programming would not be a substantial departure from the character of the licensed services.
- 3.16 In our view, securing an acceptable amount of first-run local programming, both in peaktime and across the service as a whole, plays a significant factor in the character of the service, with less importance placed against repeated programming.
- 3.17 Therefore, we are satisfied on a preliminary basis that, if we were to consent to the departure in each case, the changes included in the proposal would not substantially alter the character of each service.

Ground (b): that the departure would not unacceptably reduce the number and range of the programmes about the area or locality for which the service is licensed

- 3.18 We recognise that the number (and potentially the range) of programmes made about each of the localities served by the licences included in this request are likely to be reduced if these changes are approved, but we do not think these reductions would be unacceptable given that all services have committed to continue to cover local content, including local news and sport and entertainment within the local areas and would still be required to provide 21 hours per week of first-run local programming (of which at least eight¹ will be local news and current affairs).
- 3.19 We do not consider that the proposed changes to the qualitative programming output section of the programming commitments in each licence would in themselves result in an unacceptable reduction in the number and range of programmes about the local area. Although we note a specific commitment that "Religious groups will be featured regularly across news and entertainment" is proposed to be removed from the Liverpool licence, we consider that such involvement is likely to continue in some form as the service will still be required to "reflect life in and around the licensed area and the diversity of the community".
- 3.20 We are therefore satisfied on a preliminary basis that, if we were to consent to the departure from the character of service for each licence, it would not unacceptably reduce the number and range of programmes made about the area or locality for which each of the services is licensed.

Ground (c): that the departure would not unacceptably reduce the number of programmes made in the area or locality for which the service is licensed

3.21 For the reasons highlighted in the above section, while we recognise that the number and range of programmes may reduce as a result of the changes requested, we are satisfied on a preliminary basis that any reduction would not unacceptably reduce the number of programmes made in each area. All programmes made for the purpose of broadcasting on

a specific service are made within the licensed area of the service; this variation request is not intended to alter this characteristic.

Ground (d): that the service would continue to meet the needs of the area of locality for which the service is licensed

- 3.22 Local TV argues that all services included in this request would continue to meet the needs of the area for which they serve. Local TV Limited says it will continue to give local audiences a voice on stories that matter to them. It will continue to cover local news, sport and entertainment, focusing on issues that matter to the local communities.
- 3.23 For all the reasons set out above, we are satisfied on a preliminary basis that, if we were to consent to the departure from the character of service in each case, each service would continue to meet the needs of the area of locality. In particular, we consider that the changes being requested will provide the licensee with greater flexibility to provide the necessary focus on the local content that viewers find most valuable.

Ofcom's preliminary decisions on whether to consent to the departure from the licensed services

3.24 For the reasons listed above, we are minded to approve the requests submitted by Local TV Limited. We are seeking representations on this preliminary view, and comments on the individual variation requests for each of the seven services, which we will take into account when we make our final decisions.

A2. Ofcom's consultation principles

Ofcom has seven principles that it follows for every public written consultation:

Before the consultation

A2.1 Wherever possible, we will hold informal talks with people and organisations before announcing a big consultation, to find out whether we are thinking along the right lines. If we do not have enough time to do this, we will hold an open meeting to explain our proposals, shortly after announcing the consultation.

During the consultation

- A2.2 We will be clear about whom we are consulting, why, on what questions and for how long.
- A2.3 We will make the consultation document as short and simple as possible, with an overview of no more than two pages. We will try to make it as easy as possible for people to give us a written response.
- A2.4 We will consult for up to ten weeks, depending on the potential impact of our proposals.
- A2.5 A person within Ofcom will be in charge of making sure we follow our own guidelines and aim to reach the largest possible number of people and organisations who may be interested in the outcome of our decisions. Ofcom's Consultation Champion is the main person to contact if you have views on the way we run our consultations.
- A2.6 If we are not able to follow any of these seven principles, we will explain why.

After the consultation

A2.7 We think it is important that everyone who is interested in an issue can see other people's views, so we usually publish the responses on our website at regular intervals during and after the consultation period. After the consultation we will make our decisions and publish a statement explaining what we are going to do, and why, showing how respondents' views helped to shape these decisions.
