As a member of the general public in Chorley, I object to the station making further changes to its key commitments. Chorley hasn't changed that much since the station last changed its key commitments 2 years ago and it's clear that the station can't attract sufficient volunteers. The directors run the station as a 'closed shop' and for their own enjoyment, without involving the public. The station also broadcasts repeat interviews over and over, sometimes within the same day, let alone the same week'.

If Chorley FM is granted another amendment to its key commitments, it would be allowing a narrow-minded organisation to bypass through any issues that may arise in the future.
