Section 1

Executive summary

- 1.1 Digital One Limited, which holds a national radio multiplex licence for coverage of England, Scotland and Wales, has applied to extend the coverage area of the licence so that it also includes Northern Ireland. It is entitled to do this under statutory provisions introduced in the Digital Economy Act 2010.
- 1.2 Digital One proposes to provide coverage of Northern Ireland using six transmitters, at each of Divis, Carnmoney Hill, Londonderry, Brougher Mountain, Strabane and Limavady. It says that it will launch all of these transmitters within six months of Ofcom granting its request.
- 1.3 Before deciding whether to agree to Digital One's request, Ofcom is legally required to seek representations on the request from any interested parties. This consultation represents that opportunity. The closing-date for representations to be made is 14 March 2013; any submissions received after this date may not be considered.
- 1.4 Provided that the request meets the terms of the statute, the decision whether or not to agree to the request is at Ofcom's discretion. Our general policy is to grant requests from radio multiplex licensees to extend their coverage provided we are satisfied that:
 - doing so would be calculated to maintain or promote the development of digital sound broadcasting in the UK otherwise than by satellite;
 - the licensees' proposed coverage plans are satisfactory;
 - the licensees have the ability to maintain the licensed service; and
 - there are sufficient safeguards in place to protect the rights and interests of stations carried on the multiplexes and the rights and interests of other multiplex operators (and the stations they carry).
- 1.5 Our initial view is that Digital One's proposal would be calculated to maintain or promote the development of digital sound broadcasting in the UK, as it would provide listeners in Northern Ireland with the same range of national DAB services already available in large parts of the rest of the UK, while its proposed technical plan should ensure that this extension of choice is available in all the main population centres in Northern Ireland.
- 1.6 We seek views on the extent to which the request from Digital One satisfies any or all of these policy criteria.

Section 2

Details and background information

- 2.1 National radio multiplex licences are granted by Ofcom to enable the provision of radio stations and other types of service (e.g. data) on the DAB (Digital Audio Broadcasting) platform. The holder of a national radio multiplex licence is responsible for, among other things, delivering coverage to as much of the UK as their licence allows them to cover, and facilitating the provision of a range of radio services designed to appeal to a variety of tastes and interests.
- 2.2 A national radio multiplex licence was awarded in October 1998 to Digital One Limited. The licence commenced when the multiplex service was launched just over a year later, in November 1999, and is for a radio multiplex service designed to cover as much of England. Scotland and Wales as is technically feasible. This area is known as the 'licensed area'. The licence does not currently allow for coverage of Northern Ireland as at the time that the licence was originally advertised there was only one suitable frequency available which allowed for coverage of Northern Ireland. and the then regulator the Radio Authority decided to use this frequency for a local radio multiplex service rather than to enable the national radio multiplex service to cover the whole UK.
- 2.3 A frequency (DAB Channel 11D) has now become available which would facilitate an extension of the licensed area of the national radio multiplex service to Northern Ireland; this frequency is the same as that used by Digital One to cover England and Wales and, due to the interference that would result, would not be useable for a second local radio multiplex service for the whole of Northern Ireland.
- 2.4 Digital One currently provides indoor coverage¹ to 87.5% of households in England. Scotland and Wales, and covers 72% of the road network in the same area, using 137 transmitters.
- 2.5 Digital One has submitted an application to extend the 'licensed area' of its national radio multiplex licence so that it also includes Northern Ireland. The application from Digital One is at Annex 5.
- 2.6 Digital One proposes to provide coverage of Northern Ireland using six transmitters, at each of Divis, Carnmoney Hill, Londonderry, Brougher Mountain, Strabane and Limavady. It says that it will launch all of these transmitters within six months of Ofcom granting its request.
- 2.7 According to Digital One, these transmitters would provide indoor coverage to 74% of households, and 70% of the road network, in Northern Ireland. The addition of this coverage would result in the national radio multiplex service providing coverage of 89.5% of the households in the United Kingdom, and 75% of the UK's road network.
- 2.8 Digital One is entitled to apply for such an extension of its licensed area under section 54A of the Broadcasting Act 1996, which was inserted by the Digital Economy Act 2010. These statutory provisions set out the process a radio multiplex licensee must follow when applying to extend its licensed area.

¹ By which we mean that a robust signal can be received by a portable radio receiver inside a house.

- 2.9 Section 54A(5) states that before deciding whether to agree to a coverage extension request, Ofcom must seek representations on the request from any interested parties. This consultation represents that opportunity. The closing-date for representations to be made is **14 March 2013**; any submissions received after this date may not be considered.
- 2.10 Unlike the case in respect of local radio multiplex licences, the statute does not specify any particular criterion that must be satisfied in order for Ofcom to be able to approve a request to extend the licensed area of a national radio multiplex service. In both cases, however, the legislation still gives Ofcom the discretion as to whether or not to agree to such requests.
- 2.11 We have previously set out (in our *Statement on commercial radio localness regulation*²) how we will exercise this discretion in relation to requests from the holders of local radio multiplex licences to extend their coverage into new areas. Our general policy is to grant such requests provided we are satisfied that:
 - doing so would be calculated to maintain or promote the development of digital sound broadcasting in the UK otherwise than by satellite;
 - the licensees' proposed coverage plans are satisfactory;
 - the licensees have the ability to maintain the licensed service; and
 - there are sufficient safeguards in place to protect the rights and interests of stations carried on the multiplexes and the rights and interests of other multiplex operators (and the stations they carry).
- 2.12 We consider that these criteria are equally relevant to a coverage extension request from the holder of a national radio multiplex licence, and therefore we seek views on the extent to which the request from Digital One satisfies any or all of these policy criteria (see Annex 4 for a list of specific questions).
- 2.13 Our initial view is that Digital One's proposal would be calculated to maintain or promote the development of digital sound broadcasting in the UK, as it would provide listeners in Northern Ireland with the same range of national DAB services already available in large parts of the rest of the UK, while its proposed technical plan should ensure that this extension of choice is available in all the main population centres in Northern Ireland. It would also bring Northern Ireland into line with most of the rest of the UK, where local DAB services are available alongside national services. Digital One tell us that they have confirmation from all of the services they carry that they are content for the national multiplex to be extended to Northern Ireland.

Ofcom's consultation principles

A2.1 Ofcom has published the following seven principles that it will follow for each public written consultation:

Before the consultation

A2.2 Where possible, we will hold informal talks with people and organisations before announcing a big consultation to find out whether we are thinking in the right direction. If we do not have enough time to do this, we will hold an open meeting to explain our proposals shortly after announcing the consultation.

During the consultation

- A2.3 We will be clear about who we are consulting, why, on what questions and for how long.
- A2.4 We will make the consultation document as short and simple as possible with a summary of no more than two pages. We will try to make it as easy as possible to give us a written response. If the consultation is complicated, we may provide a shortened Plain English Guide for smaller organisations or individuals who would otherwise not be able to spare the time to share their views.
- A2.5 We will consult for up to 10 weeks depending on the potential impact of our proposals.
- A2.6 A person within Ofcom will be in charge of making sure we follow our own guidelines and reach out to the largest number of people and organisations interested in the outcome of our decisions. Ofcom's 'Consultation Champion' will also be the main person to contact with views on the way we run our consultations.
- A2.7 If we are not able to follow one of these principles, we will explain why.

After the consultation

A2.8 We think it is important for everyone interested in an issue to see the views of others during a consultation. We would usually publish all the responses we have received on our website. In our statement, we will give reasons for our decisions and will give an account of how the views of those concerned helped shape those decisions.

Request to extend DLA of the Digital One multiplex to include Northern Ireland

Dear Neil,

Digital One is making a request to Ofcom to extend the DLA of the Digital One national DAB multiplex (DM01) to additionally serve the province of Northern Ireland which is not currently within the Digital Licensed Area (DLA).

In accordance with Section 54A of the Broadcasting Act 1996 (as amended by the Digital Economy Act 2010), Digital One asks that Ofcom consider this request against the following statutory criterion:

The application must include a technical plan detailing the proposed coverage area, estimated timetable and the technical means by which it would be achieved;

Digital One submitted a full technical plan to Ofcom on 6th December 2012 detailing the proposed coverage area and the technical means by which it would be achieved. In summary, Digital One proposes six new transmitters which would be brought into operation within six months of Ofcom granting consent to our request. These transmitters will be collocated with transmitters used to provide the BBC's National DAB service and will operate at the same effective radiated power (erp). The proposed extension will operate on the same channel as the Digital One service in England and Wales (block 11D).

Ofcom has also asked that Digital One address the following further policy criteria:

The extension would be calculated to maintain or promote the development of digital sound broadcasting otherwise than by satellite,

By granting Digital One an extension to the current Digital One DLA, we will be able to establish a stable national DAB service in Northern Ireland for the first time. Although several of the services currently carried on the Digital One multiplex in England, Wales and Scotland are already broadcast on the Score Digital local DAB platform in Northern Ireland, this proposed extension will allow a number of new services to be broadcast there for the first time. With the current line-up of services on Digital One, these new services include Planet Rock, Premier Christian Radio, BFBS, Absolute Radio, Absolute 80's, Absolute 90's, Jazz FM, Smooth Radio UK and Smooth 70's.



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the licensees have the ability to maintain the licensed service;

Digital One is an established multiplex operator that has successfully operated the national commercial DAB multiplex since November 1999. Digital One is owned by Arqiva who also operate 20 local DAB licences and has announced plans to launch digital radio services in three further areas in 2013. The new transmitters will be built and operated by Arqiva alongside the networks they already provide for the BBC National and Score Digital local services.

there are sufficient safeguards in place to protect the rights and interests of stations carried on the multiplexes and the rights and interests of other multiplex operators (and the stations they carry).

We propose to significantly increase the range of services available to listeners in Northern Ireland by building a well designed and cost-effective network of six transmitters in the province. We have consulted with the radio stations carried on our national DAB service and have their support for this application. The new transmitters will have a small effect on the effective coverage of the co-frequency regional DAB service provided by Switchdigital in Central Scotland. We have discussed this with Switchdigital and agreed a package of measures including increased power for that service from the Darvel and Braid Hills transmitters in order to combat the effect of the new Digital One transmitters in Northern Ireland.

Coverage maps, transmission characteristics and predicted coverage figures are shown at the end of this letter.

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


Figure 1: Digital One (11D) Indoor Coverage - 1%T interference (extended UK Grid)



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


Figure 2: Digital One (11D) Outdoor/Mobile Coverage - 1%T interference (extended UK Grid)
