Section 1

Executive summary

- 1.1 Ofcom has received a Format change request from Swansea Bay Radio Ltd, which holds a local FM commercial radio licence for Swansea, with regard to its service 'Nation 80s'. Swansea Bay Radio is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Town & Country Broadcasting Ltd.
- 1.2 The station's Format describes the type of programme service which it is required to provide, and forms part of the station's licence.
- 1.3 Swansea Bay Radio Ltd wishes to change the 'Character of Service' of Nation 80s published Format so it may limit the requirement to deliver certain speech obligations (news, information and comment) set out in the character of service. No change is being sought with regard to the music requirements or the target audience of adults aged 35+.
- 1.4 A request for a Format change can be approved only if it satisfies at least one of the five criteria set out in section 106(1A) of the Broadcasting Act 1990 (as amended). The criteria are set out in full in Section 2 of this document.
- 1.5 We do not consider that Swansea Bay Radio's request meets criterion (a), that the departure would not substantially alter the character of service. As a result, we are required to consult on the request.
- 1.6 We are therefore seeking views on the request, having particular regard to the Format change criteria set out in the Broadcasting Act 1990.

Section 2

Details and background information

- 2.1 Ofcom has received a Format change request from Swansea Bay Radio Ltd, which holds a local FM commercial radio licence for the Swansea Bay area, with regard to its service 'Nation 80s'. Swansea Bay Radio Ltd is owned by Town and Country Broadcasting Ltd.
- 2.2 The station launched in November 2006 as Swansea Bay Radio, and has a Measured Coverage Area of 314,466 adults (aged 15+). In June 2012 the licensee changed the name of the radio station to Nation 80s.
- 2.3 Swansea Bay Radio Ltd now wishes to change the 'Character of Service' of the published Format of Nation 80s so it would no longer be required to deliver certain speech related requirements. No change is being sought to the music requirements or target audience of those aged 35+.

Existing Character of Service (as set out in Nation 80s published Format):

A LOCAL SPEECH AND MUSIC STATION FOR THE SWANSEA AREA, WITH 24-HOUR NEWS, INFORMATION AND COMMENT AIMED PRIMARILY AT THE 35+ AGE GROUP, WITH A PREDOMINATELY GOLD AND EASY LISTENING MIX OF MUSIC, REGULARLY REFLECTING WELSH CULTURE AND LANGUAGE

The new Character of Service proposed by Nation 80s is as follows:

A STATION FOR THE SWANSEA AREA, AIMED PRIMARILY AT THE 35+ AGE GROUP WITH A PREDOMINATELY GOLD AND EASY LISTENING MIX OF MUSIC, REGULARLY REFLECTING WELSH CULTURE AND LANGUAGE

2.4 This Swansea Bay licence was awarded by Ofcom in November 2005. In addition to the winning application from Swansea Bay Radio, now Nation 80s, there were two other applicants for the licence:

- 2.5 Under section 106(1A) of the Broadcasting Act 1990 (as amended), Ofcom may consent to a change of a Format only if it is satisfied that *at least* one of the following five statutory criteria is satisfied:
 - (a) that the departure would not substantially alter the character of service
 - b) that the departure would not narrow the range of programmes available by way of relevant independent radio services to persons living the area or locality for which the service is licensed to be provided;

- (c) that the departure would be conducive to the maintenance or promotion of fair and effective competition
- (d) that there is evidence that, amongst persons living in that area or locality, there is a significant demand for, or significant support for, the change that would result from the departure; or
- (e) that (i) the departure would result from programmes included in the licensed service ceasing to be made at premises in the area or locality for which the service is provided, but (ii) those programmes would continue to be made wholly or partly at premises within the approved area (as defined in section 314 of the Communications Act 2003 (local content and character of services)).
- 2.6 Even if Ofcom is of the opinion that the proposed change satisfies one of more of the statutory criteria above, there may be reasons (depending on the particular circumstances of the case) why Ofcom may not consent to the proposed change. - 2.7 Given that the change proposed by Swansea Bay Radio affects the station's core requirement to be a 'A LOCAL SPEECH AND MUSIC STATION FOR THE SWANSEA AREA, WITH 24-HOUR NEWS, INFORMATION AND COMMENT', and requires a significant rewording of its published Character of Service, we do not consider that Swansea Bay Radio's request meets criterion (a), that the departure would not substantially alter the character of service. Therefore, in accordance with section 106ZA of the1990 Broadcasting Act, we are consulting on the request.
- 2.8 When considering whether criterion (b) is satisfied (the change would not narrow the range of programmes available in the area by way of relevant independent radio services), neither local DAB services nor BBC services 'count' as relevant independent radio services. The relevant independent radio services are those local analogue commercial and community stations which operate in the region, which are listed in Annex 7.
- 2.9 Annex 5 contains the Format change request submitted by Swansea Bay Radio, in which an argument is made that the output of Nation 80s would not narrow the range of programmes available by way of independent radio services to persons living in the area and that, criterion (b) is satisfied.
- 2.10 We are seeking views on the request, having particular regard to the Format change criteria set out in Section 106(1A) (b) to (d) of the Broadcasting Act 1990 (as amended), as set out above. Section 106(1A)(e) is not relevant to this request.

Ofcom's consultation principles

A2.1 Of com has published the following seven principles that it will follow for each public written consultation:

Before the consultation

A2.2 Where possible, we will hold informal talks with people and organisations before announcing a big consultation to find out whether we are thinking in the right direction. If we do not have enough time to do this, we will hold an open meeting to explain our proposals shortly after announcing the consultation.

During the consultation

- A2.3 We will be clear about who we are consulting, why, on what questions and for how long.
- A2.4 We will make the consultation document as short and simple as possible with a summary of no more than two pages. We will try to make it as easy as possible to give us a written response. If the consultation is complicated, we may provide a shortened Plain English Guide for smaller organisations or individuals who would otherwise not be able to spare the time to share their views.
- A2.5 We will consult for up to 10 weeks depending on the potential impact of our proposals.
- A2.6 A person within Ofcom will be in charge of making sure we follow our own guidelines and reach out to the largest number of people and organisations interested in the outcome of our decisions. Ofcom's 'Consultation Champion' will also be the main person to contact with views on the way we run our consultations.
- A2.7 If we are not able to follow one of these principles, we will explain why.

After the consultation

We are applying for this format change under section 106 (1A) of the Broadcasting Act 1990 (as amended) since we submit the following statutory criteria is satisfied:

Swansea is a very competitive local radio market and listeners are well served by a wide variety of local services. Currently, five stations serve the City and its surrounding area. The four additional services to Nation 80s and their formats are listed below;

1) The Wave

A MUSIC AND INFORMATION STATION -- MAINLY CHART AND CONTEMPORARY BUT MAY INCLUDE OLDER TRACKS -- FOR UNDER 40s IN THE SWANSEA AREA, WITH WELSH ARTISTS FEATURED AT LEAST WEEKLY

2) Real Radio

A FULL SERVICE ADULT CONTEMPORARY MUSIC STATION FOR SOUTH WALES, TARGETING PRIMARILY 25-54 YEAR-OLDS, TREATING SPEECH, INFORMATION ABOUT WALES AND LISTENER INTERACTIVITY AS IMPORTANT INGREDIENTS, AND RUNNING 24-HOUR NEWS.

3) Swansea Sound

A CLASSIC POP HITS AND INFORMATION STATION FOR OVER 30s IN THE SWANSEA AREA, HIGHLY FOCUSED ON LOCAL ISSUES, WITH AT LEAST 12 HOURS A WEEK (NOT OVERNIGHT) OF WELSH LANGUAGE PROGRAMMES AND REGULAR WEEKDAY EARLY EVENING WELSH LANGUAGE BULLETINS (HEADS IN ENGLISH)

4) Nation Radio

A PREDOMINANTLY MODERN ROCK STATION FOR 15-34 YEAR-OLDS. OTHER COMPATIBLE GENRES WILL COMPLEMENT THE OUTPUT, WHICH WILL ALSO INCLUDE COVERAGE OF LOCAL ARTISTS

The Formats above highlight that local speech, news and information is comprehensively catered for in the Swansea market by at least three of the local stations. The strength of their local information and speech content has made it difficult for Nation 80s to make its mark in this area of its output. Nation 80s has continually underperformed these three stations in audience delivery and financial performance and they each pre-launched Nation 80s (then Swansea Bay Radio) giving them a significant market advantage.

The music content has always been the most distinctive characteristic of Nation 80s, reflecting the Award statement of the station in 2005, which noted that the music of the (proposed) station was most distinctive. It was noted that Swansea Sound broadcasts a relatively contemporary mix of music, rather than the slightly older gold music that features on many local medium wave stations, and a higher level of local speech than is required by its Format. Swansea Sound has remained committed to these higher levels of local speech and has continued to bid for local sports rights for example on an exclusive basis to cement its position as the leading local information station in Swansea.

As a "full service" station, Real Radio has always been committed to local news and speech. Ofcom's own Format guidance defines a "full-service" station as one that "stands apart from more mainstream stations by virtue of its wide appeal and its generous, creative speech content. Real Radio has always been heavily committed to considerable levels of local news and speech.

Finally, The Wave has "information" as a core part of its Format and this station does an excellent job of providing local news and information to the Swansea area.

Following this Format change, Nation 80s primary distinctive characteristic will remain its music and it will continue to be defined as a service targeting listeners aged 35+. We therefore conclude that the request would not in any way narrow the range of locally available programmes.
