Under your planned "Code", subscribers will be able to lodge an appeal against wrongful accusations of infringement. It will apparently cost an Internet account holder £20.00 to do so.

When was it decided that it is lawful to charge a citizen to appeal against any crime?

The criminal justice system was based upon "Innocent until proven guilty". It is despicable that Ofcom could suggest that suspects should be fined before they can challenge any evidence against them.

It is necessary to point out that this is a fine, since the £20 appeal fee is not refunded and separate from the undisclosed "Case Fee".

The "Copyright Infringers List" seems similar to the already failing Sex Offenders List. Many people are on the list for spurious reasons, or incorrectly because there is a difficultly in challenging it. At least in that case, there is a clear and defined pathway to appeals - but there is no charge to plead innocence.

Overall, this legislation is a pathetic waste of time and is only there to satisfy the likes of Peter Mandelson and David Geffen and their massive yacht.
