Value and take action on all responses from emergency services- especially those of a voluntary nature who may not have a route to communicate through 'usual' methods. Land Search and rescue is wholly dependent on the pro-active support of the voluntary sector. (Police, Ambulance and Fire and Rescue Services are not able to climb up mountains, as I am sure the RNLI will confirm they are no good at sea.

Question 2: If you consider that our proposals for pricing ground station users for any spectrum would be likely to have a detrimental impact on safety, please let us know. In order for us to understand your assessment fully, it would be helpful if you could outline the mechanisms whereby this might happen.?:

Voluntary Search and Rescuers are mainly reliant upon private donations to function. If a substantial amount of these funds are required for spectrum then other aspects of the service will suffer. Perhaps small units may not be able to function. This would be detrimental for the general public. Many Search and Rescue Organisations are now utilized to search for lost children, elderly or mentally ill persons. If communication between searchers is inadequate then safety of the searchers and efficiency of the search would be affected.
