I believe that you are considering increasing charges to the mountain rescue and Lifeboat services for use of VHF radio frequencies - that are essentially used operationally in rescue situations - and of course for training and exercises.

I cannot understand why this would be a good idea. These services are manned by volunteers and funded through charitable donations. They provide services that would otherwise have to be paid for by the taxpayer or by expensive insurance provision where some users would inevitably fall through the net.

Increasing charges to these organisations may increase revenue from one small sector of national resource (the radio spectrum) but is likely to involve a much larger impact through the law of unintended consequence. E.g. loss of life due to lack of communications by teams that cannot afford the license. Loss of voluntary manpower as members of teams feel unappreciated by the state - reduction in net revenue to teams - eventual need to replace the current voluntary nature of teams.

This is a fine example of the need for joined up thinking and the danger of a poor decision being made by a body with a "single interest". I really would despair for our way of life in this country if we start taxing voluntary charitable organisations whose

sole purpose is saving life.

Please think again and apply some sanity. Really these users should have free use of the airwaves.

I am a teacher and mountain leader who gives up much of my free time taking young people to the mountains so I understand the value and the values of the Mountain Rescue Teams.
