**Re: Belfast Interface Project, Northern Ireland response to the consultation:  
Ofcom's Second Public Service Broadcasting Review – Phase One: The Digital  
Opportunity consultation:**

Belfast Interface Project is a membership organisation which aims to support the development of creative approaches towards the regeneration of Belfast's interface or 'peace line' areas. Our aim is to enhance and develop the knowledge base regarding Belfast's interface areas and to support interface communities in addressing conflict. We also lobby for change that is of practical benefit to interface communities.

In response to your consultation and in relation to your main objective of furthering the interests of citizen-consumers; in particular, developing *"a new broadcasting licensing regime to foster self-regulation and broaden citizen/consumer choice"* we would recommend that Ofcom considers acceptance of local community television as public service broadcasters.

We have worked closely with Northern Visions/NvTv on programming about the issues faced by interface communities in Belfast and we appreciate the social benefits which community media and local television can deliver though raising consciousness of key local issues within this society as we move towards peace.

Empowering citizens to become content providers and creating media which reflects and raises awareness of local issues and interests constitutes a valuable public service. It enhances skills, encourages a sense of place and ownership of the city and has the potential to foster greater citizenship.

Central funding provisions have been made in the Communications Act for community radio and local digital television. Ofcom should consider a fund, which could potentially be drawn from the licence fee and from top-slicing commercial broadcasting licences or other central government sources.

Regarding aspects of work required to bring about a UK map of local and community television following analogue TV switch-off post 2010, we would request your assurance that no planning, at this stage, precludes a network of local digital multiplexes.

In relation to the development of local television in Belfast, we should be grateful if Ofcom would support NvTv being carried on Freeview as a local public service broadcaster. Such a development would ensure that everyone in the city, regardless of income, has access to a valuable local service and would support the efforts of all of us who are working to create a socially inclusive society as well as nurturing the city's cultural and creative assets and talent.
