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Question 1:To what extent do you consider that DTT, DSat, cable and

The key aspects of competition would be as seen previously between Sky and Virgin, purely a financial battle between providers and ignoring the consumers. Would lead to increasing domination of sport by Sky, to the detriment of those sports as currently seen in football. The cheque book rules, local sport suffers with all finance going to the big clubs and TV forces smaller clubs into the need to conform to Sky's needs.

Question 5:Do you consider that if Sky were to become the only provider of pay TV on the DTT platform it would be likely to have a significant detrimental effect on competition in the long term? How might this affect the development of other platforms for the delivery of pay TV services?:

Sky moving to free view but needing a different box would eventually eliminate competition by offering sport and channels not available elsewhere at initially low prices. As the sole rights to screen sports would be bought up by Sky, other platforms would not enter the market, as we see, all the most popular sports are no longer on BBC as they cannot financially compete.

Question 6:To what extent, if at all, do you consider that the Proposal would be likely to lead to any of the public policy concerns outlined at Section 4?:

The main concern is those people who cannot afford to pay for TV over the current licence fee.

competition would be limited to getting the largest amount of subscribers in the short term, hoping to eliminate any competition, this putting the current free view platform in doubt.

Question 7:Specifically, to what extent do you consider that the Proposal would be likely to lead to consumer confusion?:

Very great confusion, as was seen with the two VCR formats, with the inevitable demise of one of them, as in Beta max.

This may be the way the battle that is happening over HD players, between HDTV and BLUERAY,

the result may be as with VCR, one will win, but the consumer will lose if the wrong format is chosen.

Very important, pay programmes must be on the same set top box as free view, and programmes must be additional, as Setanta.

The concerns over dominance of TV rights and its effect on other suppliers (i.e. BBC) remain, and Skys effect effect on things not directly concerned with TV, mainly sport.

If so, what form should those conditions/directions take?:

I don't believe that there significant conditions that Sky would accept that could prevent a detrimental effect on the competition, they would get around any conditions set. What reason can they have to even consider being on free view, as they already have a complete subscription package, other than to eliminate a package aimed at people who are not prepared to pay for their channels.
