



Notice of Ofcom's proposals to make licence charges regulations

The Wireless Telegraphy Act (Licence Charges)
(Amendment) Regulations 2007

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Section 1

Summary

1.1 On 6 July 2006, Ofcom published a consultation document concerning modifications to Wireless Telegraphy Act licence charges (“the consultation”¹). The consultation set out a number of proposals for modifying Wireless Telegraphy Act (“WT Act”) licence charges. Ofcom carefully considered the responses to this consultation and issued a statement explaining its decisions on 10th January 2007. This statutory notice explains Ofcom’s intention to vary the Wireless Telegraphy (Licence Charges) Regulations 2005 (“the existing regulations”). The Wireless Telegraphy (Licence Charges) (Amendment) Regulations (“the proposed regulations”) will implement a number of Ofcom’s decisions following the consultation specifically in relation to the following licence classes:

- Community Radio licences - simplification of licence charges to implement a single licence of £250;
- Community Television Relay - introduction of new licence class for self help TV at flat five year licence fee of £75, this was originally covered in a policy separate consultation² which closed on 1 March 2007;
- Broadcasting Services - introduction of existing licence class and fee for National and Regional Analogue Television Transmission into licence charges regulations;
- National Public Safety licence classes at 380-385 MHz and 390 MHz to 395 MHz - publication of existing fees and licence classes in licence charges regulations;
- Self Co-ordinated links - additional frequencies to be made available at 71 - 76GHz and 81 - 86GHz at existing rates of £50 per link;
- Point to Point Fixed Links – modification of fee calculation in order to enable Ofcom to offer credits for the early surrender of fixed links;
- Fixed Wireless Access - additional frequency (10 GHz) added at existing rate of £5,000 per licence per 60 month period;
- Maritime – temporary licence classes included for Coastal Station Radio at existing rates, minor typographical errors corrected;
- Programme Making and Special Events (20% overall increase weighted towards exclusive users of spectrum);
- Public Wireless Networks – introduction of new licence class for the Channel Islands and Isle of Man with fee based on comparative population pro-rata as the national rates set for United Kingdom mainland for second generation cellular services;
- Satellite (Transportable Earth Station) - extension of existing frequency bands available to the class;

- Science and Technology - introduction of two new miscellaneous licence classes; a short term licence at a rate of £20 per licence for up to 1 year or a long term licence at a rate of £50 per licence for up to five years; and
 - Ground Probing Radar - introduction of a new fee and licence class.
- 1.2 The remaining licence classes addressed (Business Radio (except National Public Safety), Satellite and Coastal Station Radio (Training School)), in the consultation will be dealt with in a separate set of Regulations later in 2007. It is expected that the later regulations will be implemented in early 2008.
- 1.3 Section 2 of this document provides general background to the policy and regulatory framework for WT Act licence charges. It also describes the effect of the proposed changes to WT Act licence charges. Section 3 describes the proposed editorial changes to the existing regulations. A Regulatory Impact Assessment can be found at Annex 4. The RIA sets out the risks, costs and benefits of Ofcom's decision and the effects that these will have on the costs to business. The proposed regulations are included at Annex 6. Further hard copies of these Regulations are available from Ofcom at 2a Southwark Bridge Road, London SE1 9HA from the contact specified in Annex 1 for responding to this Notice. Comments on the proposed regulations are invited by 2 July 2007. This consultation period is shorter than the standard 10 week consultation period because this statutory notice follows a policy consultation, issued in July 2006, which fully considered the policy impact of the proposals. - 1.4 Once the consultation has closed, Ofcom will consider the responses and issue a statement. Ofcom expects the regulations to be in place by the end of August 2007.

Section 2

Notice of proposals

Introduction

- 2.1 Under the Communications Act 2003 (“the 2003 Act”) and section 3 of the WT Act, Ofcom has the general duty to promote the optimal use of the spectrum. The Wireless Telegraphy Act not only enables Ofcom to recover the cost of managing WT Act licences but also permits the use of market mechanisms in spectrum management. For non-auctioned spectrum, the Wireless Telegraphy Act permits Ofcom to use ‘Administered Incentive Pricing’ (“AIP”), whereby prices for annual licence fees are set above administrative cost to reflect a range of spectrum management objectives. These Wireless Telegraphy Act licence fees must be prescribed in regulations in the form of a statutory instrument.

Background

- 2.2 In July 2006, Ofcom issued a consultation document³ entitled “Modifications to Spectrum Pricing” (“the consultation”) which detailed its plans to alter wireless telegraphy licence charges. After carefully considering the responses, Ofcom published its final policy statement⁴ on 10 January 2007 (“the statement”). The statement explained our intention to go ahead with the proposals largely unchanged.
- 2.3 Section 12 of the Wireless Telegraphy Act permits the use of spectrum pricing by requiring Ofcom to prescribe in Regulations sums payable for WT Act licences. This power enables Ofcom to recover the cost of administering and managing Wireless Telegraphy Act licences. However, Ofcom also has a range of duties under section 3 of the WT Act which require Ofcom to efficiently manage the radio spectrum. Consequently, section 13 of the Wireless Telegraphy Act 2006 permits Ofcom to recover sums greater than those it incurs in performing its spectrum management functions in order to provide incentives to licensees to use their spectrum more efficiently. This is known as Administered Incentive Pricing (AIP).

Notice of proposal to amend the existing regulations

- 2.4 Notice of the proposal to amend the existing regulations is hereby given in accordance with section 122(4) of the Wireless Telegraphy Act and published in accordance with section 122(5) of this Act for a statutory consultation period of one month and one day, which ends on 2 July 2007.
- 2.5 Section 122(5) of the Wireless Telegraphy Act provides that the above mentioned notice must:
- a) state that Ofcom proposes to make the Regulations in question;
 - b) set out the general effect of the Regulations;
 - c) specify an address from which a copy of the proposed regulations may be obtained; and

- d) specify a time before any representations with respect of the proposal must be made to Ofcom. This time must be no earlier than the end of the period of one month beginning with the day after the latest day on which the notice is given or published.
- 2.6 Each of these procedural requirements is dealt with below.
- 2.7 The proposed regulations will take effect as the Wireless Telegraphy (Licence Charges) (Amendment) Regulations 2007 ("the Regulations") when they come into force. The Regulations are set out in draft in Annex 6 for consultation. The final version of the regulations may change in appearance to simplify their layout.
- 2.8 In line with Ofcom's overall approach to spectrum pricing, (ie continuing and widening the application of AIP), Ofcom is making detailed proposals to update the level of fees for certain licence classes (including those where AIP is not appropriate and also for new types of radio use), which would apply when the new regulations come into force. This section of the document describes the changes which are proposed. The policy reasoning for the changes is described in detail in the Modifications to Spectrum Pricing Statement. The key textual changes proposed in the draft Regulations are summarised in Figure 1.
- 2.9 The proposed regulations introduce new or modified fees for a number of licence classes. In the following list sector headings are shown in red and licence classes in black:

Broadcasting

Community Radio

- removal of current fee scale and introduction of a simplified, waveband-neutral, fee of £250 per transmitting station per year;

Community Television Relay

- introduction of a new licence class for self-help TV at five-year fee of £75;

Broadcasting Services

- insertion of the current national analogue television licence classes into the regulations at existing rates (previously covered under Regulation 6 of the existing regulations);

Business Radio

National Public Safety

- insertion of existing fees for United Kingdom National Public Safety licences at 380-385 MHz and 390-395 MHz into the proposed regulations (previously covered under Regulation 6 of the existing regulations);
- Annex 5 depicts the charging zones for UK National Public Safety licences;

Fixed Links

Self Co-ordinated links

- additional frequencies made available at; 71 - 76 GHz & 81 – 86 GHz Bands to be charged at same rate as existing bands (£50 on issue for a period of 12 months);

Point to Point Fixed Links

- modification of fee calculation mechanism for Fixed link licences to enable those who inform Ofcom of their early surrender of links to receive a credit against their future licence charges. This will enable Ofcom to reassign these channels during the remaining term of the licence;
- removal of path length link factor for Fixed Link licences in the Channel Islands and Isle of Man, to enable us to charge proportional fees in the channel islands and isle of man;

Fixed Wireless Access

Fixed Wireless Access (3.4, 3.6-4.2 GHz Guernsey, Jersey and Isle of Man)

- addition of 10 GHz frequency to existing licence class charged at existing rates;

Maritime

Coastal Station Radio (Temporary)

- Introduction of temporary licence classes for Coast Station Radio (International), (Marina) and (UK) at existing rates;

Other licence classes

- Correction of various minor typographical errors

Programme Making and Special Events

- increases to many of the individual fees specified in the current regulations aimed at an overall average increase of 20% with a higher increase for some exclusive-spectrum use licences, particularly in the 65-470 MHz frequency range;
- some simplification of the fee structure through the consolidation of existing frequency ranges;
- introduction of an online 12 hour booking system at a discounted fee for digital wireless cameras;
- adjustment to the method of calculating areas to increase the population coverage for each area charged aimed at removing some inconsistencies for less populous areas;

Public Wireless Networks

- new fee scale introduced for the Channel Islands and Isle of Man. Based pro rata by comparative population to the national rates charged for the United Kingdom mainland for second generation networks;

Satellite

- introduction of additional frequency bands for Satellite (Transportable Earth Station) licence class (this will extend the frequency range available to licensees from 14.00-14.5 GHz to 13.78-14.5 GHz);

Science and Technology

- introduction of two new miscellaneous licence classes, at a rate of £20 for short term licences for up to one year or £50 for long term licences for up to five years; and
- introduction of Ground Probing Radar licence class at a rate of £50 for three years.

2.10 Please note that the remaining licence classes addressed in the Ofcom statement of 10 January will be dealt with in a separate regulatory statement to be consulted on later in 2007. It is expected that these Regulations will come into effect in early 2008.

2.11 The general effect of the Wireless Telegraphy (Licence Charges) (Amendment) Regulations 2007 is set out in the next section.

2.12 Comments or representations concerning the proposed regulations are invited by 2 July 2007. This is shorter than Ofcom's standard 10 week period (see Annex 1) because this consultation is a statutory notice of Ofcom's intention to make the Regulations. Ofcom held a standard ten week policy consultation in July 2006. The consultation, Modifications to Spectrum Pricing closed on 15 September 2006 and is available at http://www.ofcom.org.uk/consult/condocs/spec_pricing/spec_pricing/.

Next steps

2.13 The new regulations will amend the existing regulations and, amongst other things, make certain changes necessary to implement the policy decisions set out in the Statement. Subject to considering any representations made during the consultation, Ofcom expects to make these regulations in July with a view to them coming into force in late August 2007.

Section 3

General Effect of the proposed Wireless Telegraphy Regulations

- 3.1 The proposed Regulations (copy at Annex 6) will amend the existing legal framework for the spectrum pricing arrangements that applies to all licence classes managed by Ofcom. In making the proposed regulations, Ofcom has had regard to the matters specified in section 3 of the Wireless Telegraphy Act and is exercising its powers under sections 12 and 13(2) of the Wireless Telegraphy Act, which enable Ofcom to set charges for Wireless Telegraphy licences, and section 403 of the Communications Act.

Extent of application

- 3.2 The Amendment Regulations will apply in the United Kingdom, the Channel Isles and the Isle of Man.

Proposed changes to the existing Regulations

- 3.3 The Amendment Regulations will set out the relevant licence charges for Community Radio, Programme Making and Special Events, Fixed Wireless Access, National Analogue Television Networks, Public Wireless Networks, Public Safety Radio licences in the 380-395 MHz band, Self Help TV and Miscellaneous use. The regulations amend the relevant parts of the Wireless Telegraphy Act (Licence Charges) Regulations 2005 (“the Existing Regulations”).
- 3.4 Regulation 1 sets out the citation and commencement. The provisions in relation to Fixed Links will come into force slightly later than the rest of the regulations.
- 3.5 Regulation 2 provides for the amendment of the existing regulations.
- 3.6 Regulation 3 sets out the provisions concerning the interpretation of the regulations. Most of these relate to Schedule 2. For example, a new definition for “Self-Coordinated Link licence” has been added.

Regulation 4

- 3.7 Regulation 4 amends the existing regulation 4. Regulation 4 (a) amends the requirement to prescribe payments for less than a 12 month period for Self Co-ordinated Link licences.
- 3.8 Regulation 4 (b) removes the requirement for Point to Point Fixed Link licensees with a licence of less than 12 months to pay a minimum fee of £75.

Regulation 5

- 3.9 Regulation 5 (a) removes the existing fee structure for Community Radio licences and replaces this with a flat fee of £75 per licence
- 3.10 Further, it inserts a new Community Television Relay licence class with a fee of £75 and new licence classes for Broadcasting Services (Transmission of National and

Regional Analogue Television Broadcasts) for the BBC and Independent Television Networks at existing rates.

- 3.11 Regulation 5 (b) adds a new licence class for “Public Safety Radio” licences in the Business Radio sector at existing rates.
- 3.12 Regulation 5 (c) add new frequencies to the Self Coordinated Links licence class.
- 3.13 Regulation 5 (d) adds the 10Ghz band to the existing bands available to the Fixed Wireless Access licence class in Guernsey, Jersey and the Isle of Man.
- 3.14 Regulation 5 (e) corrects minor typographical errors in relation to Coastal Station Radio licences and inserts new licence classes for temporary Coastal Station Radio licences.
- 3.15 Regulations 5 (f) increases the fees for Programme Making and Special Event fixed site licences by approximately 20%.
- 3.16 Regulation 5 (g) increases the Programme Making and Special Event Link licences by approximately 20%.
- 3.17 Regulation 5 (h) inserts a new licence class for Audio Distribution Services and charges.
- 3.18 Regulation 5 (i) amends the programme making and special events low power licence class by increasing the fees by approximately 20%.
- 3.19 Regulation 5 (j) increases the Programme Making and Special Event UK Wireless Microphone (Annual) licences by approximately 20%.
- 3.20 Regulation 5 (k) increases the Programme Making and Special Event UK Wireless Microphone (Biennial) licences by approximately 20%.
- 3.21 Regulation 5 (l) inserts new licence charges for Public Wireless Networks (2G and 3G cellular) licences in Guernsey.
- 3.22 Regulation 5 (m) inserts new licence charges for Public Wireless Networks (2G and 3G cellular) licences in Jersey.
- 3.23 Regulation 5 (n) inserts new licence charges for Public Wireless Networks (2G and 3G cellular) licences in the Isle of Man.
- 3.24 Regulation 5 (o) amends the frequencies available to Satellite Transportable Earth stations.
- 3.25 Regulation 5 (p) inserts a new licence classes for Ground Probing Radar at a rate of £50 for up to 36 months and two new miscellaneous licence classes at a rate of £20 for up to 12 months and £50 for between 12 and 60 months.

Regulation 6

- 3.26 Regulation 6 amends the path length factor in schedule 7.

Annex 2

Ofcom's consultation principles

A2.1 Ofcom has published the following seven principles that it will follow for each public written consultation:

Before the consultation

A2.2 Where possible, we will hold informal talks with people and organisations before announcing a big consultation to find out whether we are thinking in the right direction. If we do not have enough time to do this, we will hold an open meeting to explain our proposals shortly after announcing the consultation.

During the consultation

A2.3 We will be clear about who we are consulting, why, on what questions and for how long.

A2.4 We will make the consultation document as short and simple as possible with a summary of no more than two pages. We will try to make it as easy as possible to give us a written response. If the consultation is complicated, we may provide a shortened version for smaller organisations or individuals who would otherwise not be able to spare the time to share their views.

A2.5 We will normally allow ten weeks for responses to consultations on issues of general interest.

A2.6 There will be a person within Ofcom who will be in charge of making sure we follow our own guidelines and reach out to the largest number of people and organizations interested in the outcome of our decisions. This individual (who we call the consultation champion) will also be the main person to contact with views on the way we run our consultations.

A2.7 If we are not able to follow one of these principles, we will explain why. This may be because a particular issue is urgent. If we need to reduce the amount of time we have set aside for a consultation, we will let those concerned know beforehand that this is a 'red flag consultation' which needs their urgent attention.

After the consultation

A2.8 We will look at each response carefully and with an open mind. We will give reasons for our decisions and will give an account of how the views of those concerned helped shape those decisions.

Annex 4

Impact Assessment

Introduction

- A4.1 In accordance with good regulatory practice, where a statutory regulation is proposed, a Regulatory Impact Assessment (“RIA”) must be undertaken. The analysis presented here, when read in conjunction with the rest of this document, represents a Regulatory Impact Assessment as defined by section 7 of the Communications Act 2003 (“the Act”) for amending the Wireless Telegraphy (Licence Charges) Regulations 2005.
- A4.2 You should send any comments on this RIA to Ofcom by the closing date for this consultation. We will consider all comments before deciding whether to implement our proposals.
- A4.3 RIAs provide a valuable way of assessing different options for regulation and showing why the preferred option was chosen. They form part of best practice policy-making and are commonly used by other regulators. The requirement to carry out impact assessments is reflected in section 7 of the Act, which stipulates that generally we have to carry out impact assessments where our proposals would be likely to have a significant effect on businesses or the general public, or when there is a major change in Ofcom’s activities. However, as a matter of policy Ofcom is committed to carrying out and publishing impact assessments in relation to the great majority of our policy decisions. Background

- A4.4 Ofcom issued a consultation document and subsequent statement concerning modifications to spectrum pricing on the 6th of July 2006 and 10th January 2007 respectively. The consultation concerned making changes to a number of Wireless Telegraphy Act licence charges. The majority of these are to be implemented through the Regulations to which this RIA relates but the remainder will be dealt with in a separate document to be published later this year.
- A4.5 Section 12 of the Wireless Telegraphy Act 2006 (“The WT Act”) permits the use of spectrum pricing by requiring Ofcom to prescribe in Regulations sums payable for WT Act licences. This power enables Ofcom to recover the cost of administering and managing Wireless Telegraphy Act licences. However, Ofcom also has a range of duties under section 3 of the WT Act which require Ofcom to efficiently manage the radio spectrum. Consequently, section 13 of the Wireless Telegraphy Act 2006 permits Ofcom to recover sums greater than those it incurs in performing its spectrum management functions in order to provide incentives to licensees to use their spectrum more efficiently. This is known as Administered Incentive Pricing (AIP).

Proposal

- A4.6 This RIA relates to the proposal to update and modify Wireless Telegraphy licence charges for WT Act licences. The current statutory instrument governing the licence

charges for WT Act licences is “The Wireless Telegraphy (licence charges) Regulations 2005 (SI 2005 N0.1378) (“the existing Regulations”). This update will be achieved through an Amendment to the existing Regulations. The nature of the changes proposed fall into the following three categories:

- a) widening the scope of existing licence charges to other licence products or frequencies;
- b) increasing licence charges to fully recover Ofcom’s costs; and
- c) simplifying and reducing licence charges to rationalise pricing with other areas.

The citizen and/or consumer interest

A4.7 Ofcom takes account of the impact of its decisions upon both citizen and consumer interests in the markets it regulates. In proposing changes to the existing Regulations we have considered the wider impact beyond immediate stakeholders in the radiocommunications community. We believe that the proposals will be of benefit to consumers for the following reasons:

- i) continued use of AIP will encourage more efficient use of the radio spectrum making more spectrum available to potential new uses;
- ii) simplified licence charges will facilitate fee payment and reduce costs to licensees by reducing the number of transactions;
- iii) the measures proposed will reduce the regulatory burden for some licensees such as Community Radio users, offering them simplified, more flexible licences at a lower price;
- iv) the introduction of new frequencies for self co-ordinated links will improve choice for consumers and industry; and
- v) a lighter licensing regime for coastal station radio schools will ensure consistency of pricing with coastal station radio licences and offer a simplified licensing regime to licensees.

Ofcom’s policy objective

A4.8 Ofcom has a statutory to make efficient use of the radiospectrum. The WT Act 2006 enables Ofcom to charge administered incentive pricing for Wireless Telegraphy Act licences. Additionally, Ofcom seeks wherever possible, to reduce the regulatory burden upon its stakeholders, in this instance users of the radio spectrum. One way in which it can do this is to simplify and rationalise licence products available to consumers.

Options considered

A4.9 The options open to Ofcom in relation to the fees charged for WT Act licences generally fall into the following categories:

- i) Not to charge for WT Act licences;
- ii) To charge cost recovery prices for WT licences;

- iii) To charge the full rate of AIP identified by independent consultants; or
- iv) a mixture of these options.

Analysis of options

A4.10 Ofcom uses these options in a variety of circumstances to achieve its spectrum management objectives. The effect of these regulations has not increased the number of free licences. Some licence classes such as PMSE have increased in order to recover the costs associated with these licences. In other areas we propose to continue to charge the AIP rate identified by Indenpen in the 2004 Spectrum pricing report.

Benefits

A4.11 In general the proposed regulations will reduce the regulatory burden to licensees by clarifying the licence charging regime in certain areas and making more spectrum available to licensees.

Costs to business

A4.12 The cost of certain WT Act licences will increase as a result of the introduction of these Regulations. These costs need to be offset against the benefits to the economy as a whole from more efficient use of spectrum. WT Act licences enable Ofcom to recover the administrative cost of issuing and processing licences as well as enforcement and indirect costs.

Costs to Ofcom

A4.13 There are one-off administrative costs associated with making a Statutory Instrument. Ofcom considers the implementation costs to be low and offset by the benefits outlined in section 2 of the consultation document⁵. There may be a slight reduction in spectrum management costs in certain areas.

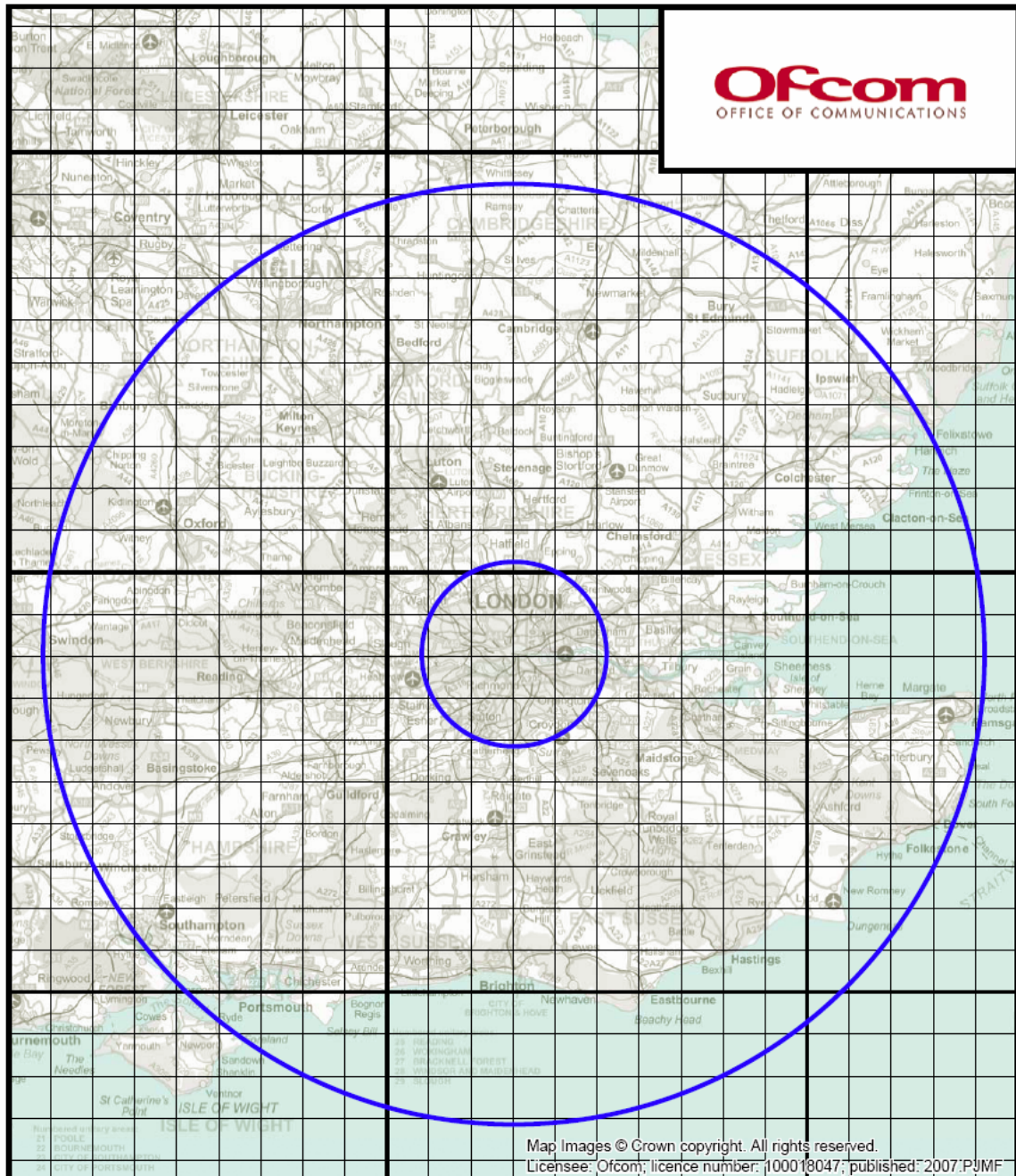
Conclusion

The Office of Communications (“OFCOM”) make the following Regulations in exercise of the powers conferred by sections 12, 13(2) and 122(7) of the Wireless Telegraphy Act 2006⁽⁶⁾ (“the Act”).

Before making these Regulations OFCOM have given notice of their proposal to do so in accordance with section 122(4)(a) of the Act, published notice of their proposal in accordance with section 122(4)(b) of the Act, and have considered the representations made to them before the time specified in the notice in accordance with section 122(4)(c) of the Act.

Citation and commencement

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Wireless Telegraphy (Licence Charges) (Amendment) Regulations 2007 and shall come into force on [] 2007.

Amendment of the Wireless Telegraphy (Licence Charges) Regulations 2005

2. The Wireless Telegraphy (Licence Charges) Regulations 2005⁽⁷⁾ shall be amended in accordance with the following provisions of these Regulations.

Amendment of regulation 3
