The single most important evolution of recent times is one of ease of communication and immediate access to information.

Fine-tuning existing web communication systems is energy and financially expensive, for diminishing returns.

Focus should be aimed at, paradoxically, *Simplifying* existing proven systems, *Educating* those 20% of the population who are net-illiterate, *Providing* accessible (State-funded) terminals for the use of all, and ensuring the *Integrity* of web-based commerce.

SEPI could be the new Rock n' Roll, the acronym that could, just, take the imagination of a jaded industry...

Only *then* will it really be cost-efficient to add gloss to existing efficient systems.

(SEPI could, on the other hand, perhaps suggest Slothful Enterprise Promotes Inertia.)

It all depends what we, the population and not the commercial developer, want. Evolution is so very often put on its head, answers looking for problems; there is much to be made in working from real problems towards real solutions. (How many of us have zapper buttons we never use...?

This has been a non-technical response to your campaign, perhaps not what you wanted. But fundamental strategy is in danger of being lost in a fog of incidental technology. Back to Basics.
